In an effort to recover some of the past passenger activity that was lost during the Great Recession from 2008 through 2013, Staff will make a presentation outlining the program Staff has implemented to help bring the Airport community together in obtaining goals and objectives of mutual interest. Mission 5 seeks to recover an activity level of five million annual passengers through Hollywood Burbank Airport within the next ten years.

On May 14, 2016, members of the Airport Fire Department and Airport staff participated in the Burbank Fire Department's annual Fire Service Day. MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE OPERATIONS AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE BURBANK-GLENDALE-PASADENA AIRPORT AUTHORITY

MONDAY, MAY 2, 2016

A regular meeting of the Operations and Development Committee was called to order this date in the Airport Skyroom of the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority, 2627 Hollywood Way, Burbank, California, at 8:33 a.m., by Chairman Brown.

1. Approval of Agenda

Commissioner Selvidge moved approval of the agenda; there being no objection, the agenda was approved 3–0 as

presented.

2. Public Comment

There were no public speakers.

3. Approval of Minutes

a. April 18, 2016

Commissioner Brown moved approval of the minutes of the April 18, 2016, meeting, seconded by Commissioner Selvidge. There being no objection, the minutes were approved unanimously (3–0) as submitted by Staff.

4. Contracts and Leases

a. Rate Adjustment and Agreement Extension for HSS, Inc. Staffing Services Staff reported that in July 2013 HSS, Inc. Staffing Services ("HSS"), which provides the Airport with professional services including traffic control, guard booth staffing, and inspection services, was awarded an initial three-year contract with two one-year extensions. The Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") between the Authority and HSS provides for a CPI rate adjustment beginning in year two of the Agreement.

Regarding the CPI adjustment, Staff recommended that a CPI annual adjustment in the amount of \$12,115 be retroactively

applied effective July 31, 2015. Staff noted that the reason for the retroactive CPI adjustment is that Authority staff and HSS were negotiating HSS' request for a separate wage adjustment amounting to approximately \$56,626 per year. Staff does not recommend the additional wage increase and HSS has agreed to comply with the terms of the original Agreement, which provide for the CPI adjustment in year two of the Agreement.

Staff advised the Committee that it does not believe the security marketplace has changed substantially since the Agreement was awarded; therefore, Staff recommended that the first of two one-year extension options be exercised, extending the Agreement to July 31, 2016.

Motion

Commissioner Sinanyan moved approval of Staff's recommendation to recommend the following to the Commission: (1) approval of a CPI rate adjustment to the Agreement with HSS in the annual amount of \$12,115, retroactively effective July 31, 2015; (2) approval of a one-year extension of the Agreement for a one-year period through July 31, 2017; and (3) disapproval of the additional wage increase proposed by HSS. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Selvidge.

Motion Approved

The motion was approved unanimously (3-0).

- 5. Items for Discussion
 - a. Update: Transportation Network Company ("TNC") Operation

Commander Schmitt of the Airport Police Department ("Department") updated the Committee on the enforcement of the Authority's Interim Use and Facility Access Agreement for the TNC operation at the Airport and answered various questions from the Committee.

Commander Schmitt advised that when the agreements were initially executed with Uber, Lyft and Wingz, there was a period of approximately two months during which the Department continued to notify TNC drivers of violations without actually issuing citations. Commander Schmitt reported that on approximately April 21, 2016, the Department began citing TNC drivers for violations of the contract and, to date, approximately 14 passenger loading citations have been issued for picking up passengers in the wrong location and 19 citations have been issued to TNC drivers for not displaying trade dress, the small TNC emblem displayed on the passenger side of the windshield.

Commander Schmitt noted that since the initiation of issuing citations for violations, the TNC drivers' behavior has improved and he believes there will be less citations issued in the future.

Staff advised the Committee that a permanent Use and Facility Agreement for execution by TNC operators will be completed soon which Staff will discuss with the TNC operators serving the Airport. This agreement will take four additional steps: (1) establishment of a geofence; (2) institution of self-reporting by the TNCs; (3) institution of drop-off charges at the Airport; and (4) no advance staging is to be permitted and the TNC driver must remain in the vehicle when picking up riders.

b. Update: Parking Rate Adjustments

Staff reported that pursuant to the Commission's approval of the variable pricing strategy implementation regarding the Airport's public parking lots in April 2016, there will be daily rate adjustments as of 12:01 a.m. on May 16 in three of the Airport's public parking lots and for the short-term parking structure to determine which rates best benefit the Airport financially while still attracting passengers to the lots.

Staff reported that Lot E and the short-term parking structure are full on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays; Staff therefore decided to increase the daily rates for these two parking products by \$1, from \$23 to \$24 and from \$31 to \$32, respectively. Staff also decided to increase the daily rate for Valet parking by \$1, from \$23 to \$24. Regarding Lot C, which Staff noted has not been performing as well as some of the other lots, it was decided to try to encourage competition on the off-airport lots by decreasing the daily rate for Lot C by \$1, from \$13 to \$12.

Staff advised the Committee it will carefully monitor activity in these parking lots to determine whether the adjusted rates are effective.

4. Contracts and Leases

a. Aviation Hangar Lease, Delux Public Charter, LLC Staff presented to the Committee a proposed aviation hangar lease with Delux Public Charter, LLC ("Delux"), a Federal Aviation Regulation Part 135 aircraft operation that is owned by JetSuite, Inc. ("JetSuite") to lease a portion of

Hangar 2 at the Airport.

In February 2016 JetSuite contacted Staff requesting to lease certain general aviation facilities at the Airport to support its public charter operations. To accommodate JetSuite's expedited schedule, Staff negotiated terms to allow JetSuite in Hangar 2 on April 11, 2016, to begin improving the facilities for operations by Delux, its affiliated entity.

Key components of the proposed lease are as follows: the lease will be retroactive to April 11, 2016, for a three-year term with two one-year extension options; rent will be at the rate of \$14,245.34 per month, or \$170,944.08 annually; the space is to be used for support space for public charter operations; the security deposit is three months' rent, or \$42,736.02; and the tenant is to pay all expenses related to its occupancy, including maintenance, utilities, rest room maintenance, trash and any applicable taxes.

Staff recommended that the Committee recommend to the Commission that it approve the proposed aviation hangar lease with Delux and authorize the Authority President to execute same.

Commissioner Friedman moved approval of Staff's

recommendation.

There being no objection, the motion was approved 2–0 (one absent).

Staff presented a proposed Third Amendment ("Amendment") to the aviation hangar lease ("Lease") with Amblin' Films, Inc. ("Amblin"), formerly known as Dreamworks, LLC. The Amendment would allow Amblin's agreement with the Authority to continue on the same terms and conditions past the termination date of April 23,

2016, with rent at the current monthly rate of \$46,352 on a month-to-month basis. The initial Lease of Hangar 43 for storage of general aviation aircraft, which was for ten years and expired in May of 2013, was later extended to May of 2018 by a Second Amendment.

Amblin exercised its right to terminate the Lease as of April 23, 2016, but has requested a month-to-month extension because its relocation facilities at Van Nuys Airport will not be ready until late May or June of 2016.

Staff recommended that the Committee recommend to the Commission that it approve the proposed Third Amendment to the Aviation Hangar Lease with Amblin'

c. Consent to Assignment of Sublease between Avjet Corporation/Mercury Air Center, Inc., and Consent to Facility Tenant Agreement between Avjet Corporation/ Jet Aviation Holdings USA, Inc.

Staff presented a proposed consent to assignment of a January 28, 1999, sublease between Mercury Air Center, Inc., dba Atlantic Aviation ("Atlantic") and Avjet Corporation ("Avjet") and consent to a Facility Tenant Agreement between Jet Aviation Holdings, Inc. ("Jet") and Marc J. Foulkrod ("Subtenant").

Staff reported that at the March 21, 2016, Commission meeting, the Authority approved the assignment of the Ground Lease and Hangar Lease from Avjet to Jet due to a Stock Purchase Agreement dated March 3, 2016, for all of Avjet's stock to Jet. Following the acquisition, Jet became the new owner of Avjet, with Avjet continuing to operate as it currently does at the Airport.

As Jet is now the new owner of Avjet, Jet is seeking approval for other agreements that Avjet has with Atlantic and the Authority: a sublease between Atlantic and Avjet for Hangars 6, 7, 7A, and 7B; and a sublet of 2,952 square feet of office space in Hangar 25 to the Subtenant.

Staff recommended that the Committee recommend to the Commission that it approve the Consent of Assignment for the Sublease and the Consent to Facility Tenant Agreement and that the Authority President be authorized to execute such consents.

Commissioner Friedman moved approval of Staff's recommendation.

There being no objection, the motion was approved 2–0 (one absent).

Public Records Act request for which he stated he received no answers and was directed to meet with Authority staff to clarify his questions; whether Commissioner Friedman had received a copy of the reply to his Public Records Act request; improvements over the years to the Airport terminal and facilities; building permits which he stated the Authority had obtained to complete earthquake work on the terminal; a structure that no longer exists that permitted passengers to

board a plane at higher than surface level; the TSA

improvements being closer to the center line of the runway than the terminal is; how the Authority intends to pay for the replacement terminal project; and stated some Burbank residents do not wish to have Measure B included on the November 8, 2016, general election ballot, preferring instead that it be included on the ballot at the same time as the election of Burbank city officials.

Commissioner Friedman stated she had received a copy of Staff's response to Mr. Nolan's Public Record Act request and several other Commissioners indicated they received it also.

Commissioners Wiggins and Brown responded to Mr. Nolan's comments. Commissioner Wiggins stated it was his hope that Mr. Nolan was able to work with Staff to obtain the information he requested; Commissioner Brown thanked Mr. Nolan for attending the meeting and expressing himself and asked that he "pinpoint" certain questions and dates to facilitate Staff's providing the requested information.

Staff reported that at the March 21, 2016, Commission meeting, the Authority approved the assignment of the ground lease and hangar lease from Avjet to Jet due to a stock purchase agreement dated March 3, 2016, for the acquisition of Avjet's stock by Jet. Following the acquisition, Jet became the new owner of Avjet, with Avjet continuing to operate as it currently does at the Airport.

As Jet is now the new owner of Avjet, Jet is seeking approval for other agreements that Avjet has with Atlantic and the Authority: a sublease between Atlantic and Avjet for Hangars 6, 7, 7A, and 7B; and a sublet of 2,952 square feet of office space in Hangar 25 to the Subtenant.

At the May 2, 2016, meeting of the Finance and Administration Committee, the Committee voted 2–0 (one absent) to recommend that the Commission approve the consent of assignment for the sublease and the Consent to Facility Tenant Agreement and authorize the Authority President to execute such consents.

6. ITEMS FOR COMMISSION **APPROVAL**

a. Rate Adjustment and Agreement Extension for HSS, Inc. Staffing Services

Staff reported that in July 2013 HSS, Inc. Staffing Services ("HSS"), which provides the Airport with professional services including traffic control, guard booth staffing, and inspection services, was awarded an initial three-year contract with two one-year extensions. The Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") between the Authority and HSS provides for a CPI rate adjustment beginning in year two of the Agreement.

Regarding the CPI adjustment, Staff recommended that a CPI annual adjustment in the amount of \$12,115 be retroactively applied effective July 31, 2015. Staff noted that the reason for the retroactive CPI adjustment is due to negotiations between Authority staff and HSS regarding HSS' request for a separate wage adjustment amounting to approximately \$56,626 per year. Staff does not recommend the additional wage increase and HSS has agreed to comply with the terms of the original Agreement, which provide for the CPI adjustment in year two of the Agreement.

At its May 2, 2016, meeting, the Operations and Development Committee voted unanimously (3-0) to recommend approval of the following to the Commission: (1) A CPI rate adjustment to the Agreement with HSS in the annual amount of \$12,115, retroactively effective July 31. 2015; (2) a one-year extension of the Agreement for a oneyear period through July 31, 2017; and (3) disapproval of the

additional wage increase proposed by HSS.

b. Aviation Hangar Lease, Delux Public Charter, LLC

Prior to presenting this item, Staff reviewed with the Commission the types of commercial airline passenger service regulated and certified by the FAA and answered various questions from the Commission.

Staff presented to the Commission a proposed aviation hangar lease with Delux Public Charter, LLC ("Delux"), a Federal Aviation Regulation Part 135 aircraft operation that is owned by JetSuite, Inc. ("JetSuite") to lease a portion of Hangar 2 at the Airport.

In February 2016 JetSuite contacted Staff requesting to lease certain general aviation facilities at the Airport to support its public charter operations. To accommodate JetSuite's expedited schedule, Staff negotiated terms to allow JetSuite in Hangar 2 on April 11, 2016, to begin improving the facilities for operations by Delux, its affiliated entity.

Key components of the proposed lease are as follows: the lease will be retroactive to April 11, 2016, for a three-year term with two one-year extension options; rent will be at the rate of \$14,245.34 per month, or \$170,944.08 annually; the space is to be used for support space for public charter operations; the security deposit is three months' rent, or \$42,736.02; and the tenant is to pay all expenses related to its occupancy, including maintenance, utilities, rest room maintenance, trash and any applicable taxes.

At the May 2, 2016, meeting of the Finance and Administration Committee, the Committee voted 2–0 (one absent) to recommend that the Commission approve the proposed aviation hangar lease with Delux and authorize the Authority President to execute same.





General Comments

The Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements ("Schedule") represents the cash basis activity for the month and fiscal year-end compared to the allocation of the annual adopted budget.

The Schedule consists of two sections: Operating Activity and Facility Improvement/Noise Mitigation Transactions. Receipts are shown as positive amounts and disbursements as negative amounts. Favorable budget variances are shown as positive amounts and unfavorable variances as negative amounts. Because this Schedule is on a cash basis, cash timing differences may contribute to budget variances.

The Operating Activity receipts include charges for services (parking, landing fees and concessions), tenant rents, fuel flowage fees, other revenues and investment receipts. The Operating Activity disbursements include costs of services, materials, contracts, personnel and debt service.

Facility Improvement / Noise Mitigation Transactions represent the activity for the Authority's capital program, which consists of (a) the Sound Insulation Program, (b) Other Facility Improvement Program Projects, and (c) the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center ("RITC"). The RITC project was completed in FY 2015.

The FY 2016 Capital Program expenditures are primarily funded by the following sources:

- FAA-approved Passenger Facility Charge ("PFC") program receipts/reserves;
- Grants:
- Facility Development Funds (Authority Reserves).

The notes below provide additional information regarding the performance results detailed in the "Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements."

A Supplemental Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements reflecting the activities related to the Series 2012 Bond debt service and repayment to the Authority of the loans provided to the Rent-A-Car Companies ("RACs") for the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center / Consolidated Rental Car Facility is also presented.

NOTE (1) - Cash Receipts from Operations

Cash receipts from operations are favorably ahead of budget FYTD March due to better than expected performance primarily in parking, concessions and filming revenues. On the accrual basis, all categories of operating revenues are favorably ahead of budget FYTD 2016 by \$1,839,676. See notes 2 through 7 for additional information regarding operating receipts.

NOTE (2) - Landing/Fuel Fees

Landing fees are based on landed weight of the aircraft. Fuel fees are charged at a rate of \$0.05 a gallon to non-signatory air carriers for fuel loaded at BUR. Landing fees and fuel fees performed ahead of the budget forecast FYTD 2016. Accrual basis revenues for this line item are ahead of budget FYTD 2016 by \$61,948.

NOTE (3) - Parking Fees

Parking fee revenues performed ahead of the budget forecast. Accrual basis parking fees are \$216,150 ahead of budget FYTD 2016.

NOTE (4) - Rental Receipts - Terminal Building

Terminal Building rental receipts exceed the budget FYTD March primarily due to the timing of receipts and additional concession revenues received above the minimum annual guarantee. Accrual basis terminal building rents are \$363,486 ahead of budget FYTD 2016.

NOTE (5) - Rental Receipts - Other Buildings

Other Buildings rental receipts exceed the budget FYTD March primarily due to the timing of receipts. This line item includes a partial settlement from the unlawful detainer claim against Affordable Storage and reimbursement for utilities billed in FY 2015. Accrual basis other building receipts are \$527,671 ahead of budget in FYTD 2016.

NOTE (6) - Other Receipts

This category consists primarily of off-airport access fees and film location revenues. This line item favorably exceeds the budget FYTD March primarily due to strong film location revenues. Accrual basis other revenues are \$498,242 ahead of budget FYTD 2016.

This line item represents cash received from the investment of funds. These receipts fluctuate in response to interest rate and portfolio balance changes and the timing of coupon payments and individual investment maturities and sales. Accrual basis investment income, including the interest earned on loans to Rent-A-Car Companies, exceeds the budget FYTD March by \$172,179.

NOTE (8) - Cash Disbursements from Operations

Overall operating disbursements are favorably under budget FYTD 2016. On an accrual basis operating disbursements are favorably within budget parameters. See additional information on operating disbursements in notes 9 through 15.

NOTE (9) - Administrative Supplies & Costs

This line item includes office supplies, printing, postage and delivery, office equipment service and lease, recruiting, membership, uniform, Commission meeting, conference and training costs. This line item is under budget FYTD March primarily due lower than expected training expenses and to the timing of payments.

NOTE (10) - Operating Supplies & Maintenance

This line item includes utilities, fuel, general repairs and maintenance, landscaping, supplies and telephone costs. This line item is under budget FYTD March primarily due to lower than expected fuel costs and the timing of payments.

NOTE (11) - Contractual Operating Costs

This line item includes various contractual operating costs such as ARFF services, janitorial services, systems and vehicle repair, parking operations and the TBI Airport Management contract costs. This line item exceeds the budget FYTD March due to the timing of payments; specifically, the payment in July of May and June TBI Airport Management costs (this offsets June 2015 which was under budget by a corresponding amount). This line item is within budget on the accrual basis.

NOTE (12) - Contractual Professional Services

This line item includes various professional services such as legal, auditing, noise, financial and insurance. This line item is tracking essentially on budget FYTD March.

NOTE (13) - Wages and Benefits

Wages and Benefits consist of payroll and fringe benefit costs for the Airport Police officers, and include the impact of the terms of the new Memorandum of Understanding effective February 2014. Wages and benefits include overtime for film location services which are recovered through the related revenue. Wages and benefits are tracking essentially on budget FYTD March.

NOTE (14) - Other Operating Costs

This line item includes public relations/advertising, air service retention, license and permits and bad debt expense.

NOTE (15) - Parking Tax

The 12% City of Burbank parking tax is paid quarterly for the prior three-month period. April 2016 parking tax remittance, in the amount of \$497,133, covers the months of January, February and March 2016.

NOTE (16) - Sound Insulation Program

The FY 2016 Sound Insulation Program expenditures represents the closeout of the single family modules in the program. A Part 150 Study is in process, which may result in eligible multi-family and an additional number of single family residences being added to the sound insulation program in the future.

NOTE (17) - Other Facility Improvement Program Projects

Other Facility Improvement Program Projects expenditures exceed the budget FYTD 2016 by \$2,920,425 primarily due to FY 2015 expenditures related to the Airfield Lighting Project of \$1,335,494 and the FY 2016 Replacement Terminal Development Project expenditures. The PFC Application for the Airfield Lighting Project was approved by the FAA in August 2015 and cumulative project expenditures were reimbursed from the PFC Fund in August and September 2015.

NOTE (18) - Regional Intermodal Transportation Center

The Regional Intermodal Transportation Center project was completed in FY 2015. \$30,590 of final completion expenditures related to FY 2015 were paid in the current year.

NOTE (19) - FAA Grants - Other Facility Improvement Program Projects

FAA Grants – Other Facility Improvement Program Projects are under budget FYTD March by \$9,223 due to the timing of grant reimbursements for eligible expenditures.

NOTE (20) - Other Grants

Other grants represent federal grants, other than FAA AIP grants, and local grants that fund or partially fund the Ground Access Study. \$92,070 in grant funds were received FYTD March related to the Ground Access Study, of which approximately \$25,000 related to FY 2015 expenditures.

NOTE (21) - OCIP Insurance Refund

Due to the strong safety measures taken during the construction of the RITC and other OCIP-covered projects, the Insurance Underwriter returned \$500,000 of excess OCIP reserves to the Authority. The Authority's Financial Advisor and Bond Counsel are determing the allocation of the \$500,000 to the appropriate funding sources.

NOTE (22) - Passenger Facility Charge Receipts/Reserves

A number of capital projects are budgeted to be funded or partially funded by Passenger Facility Charges. A PFC Application was approved in August 2015 for the Airfield Lighting Project. Cumulative expenditures for this project were reimbursed from the PFC Fund in August and September 2015. This line item is ahead of budget FYTD 2016 due to the reimbursement for the Airfield Lighting Project.

NOTE (23) - Facility Development Fund (Authority Reserves)

The FY 2016 adopted budget programmed the use of Authority Reserves as a funding source for the airport share of capital projects. This line item exceeds the budget FYTD March primarily due to Replacement Terminal Project expenditures

General Comments – The debt service on the 2012 Revenue Bonds and the repayment to the Authority of the loans to the Rent-A-Car Companies ("RACs") is payable from Customer Facility Charges ("CFCs") and Facility Rents. Under the terms of the Bond Indenture, as amended, all CFCs collected subsequent to July 1, 2014 are remitted to the Bond Trustee for the 2012 Bond debt service.

On July 1, 2014, the terms and conditions of the Non-Exclusive Concession and Lease Agreement with the respective Rent-A-Car Companies became effective, including the collection of Facility Rent.

Note (1) - Customer Facility Charge ("CFC") Receipts

CFCs of \$6 per day per transaction, up to a maximum of five days, are collected and applied to the 2012 Bond debt service. CFCs received in March and fiscal year-to-date ("FYTD") exceeded the budget due to better than expected car rental activity.

Note (2) - Facility Rent

Facility Rent are under budget FYTD March due to the timing of receipts.

Note (3) - Loan Principal Repayments to the Authority

Repayments of the loan principal to the Authority from the Rent-A-Car Companies are under budget FYTD March (\$11,591) due to timing of receipts.


The principal portion of the payment will be deposited as reimbursement to the Authority's Facility Development Fund. The interest portion of the loan repayment is recorded as investment income.

Note (4) - Net RITC / ConRAC Facility Payments and Collections

A positive amount in this line indicates that cash has been received above the required payment obligations. At fiscal year-end, upon conclusion of the required reconciliation, any excess surplus accumulated will be evaluated and applied toward the allowed uses under the terms and conditions of the Non-Exclusive Concession and Lease Agreement with the Rent-A-Car Companies.

In the event of a shortfall of receipts to meet the required payment obligations (i.e., CFC collections perform under budget projections), the Authority holds the right to adjust the Facility Rent paid by the rental car companies on a 30-day notice.

STAFF REPORT PRESENTED TO THE BURBANK-GLENDALE-PASADENA AIRPORT AUTHORITY JUNE 6, 2016

TITLE VI PROGRAM

<u>SUMMARY</u>

As part of the closeout documents for the construction of the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center ("RITC"), the Department of Transportation ("DOT") requires approval of a Title VI Program ensuring that no individual will be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity that receives federal financial assistance. Staff seeks Commission approval of the attached Title VI Program.

BACKGROUND

The Authority was the recipient of several Federal Transit Agency ("FTA") grants that were used to facilitate construction of the intermodal bus station portion of the RITC. Use of such federal grants requires that the Authority ensure that all facets of the federally-assisted construction effort comply with federal grant assurances, including those assurances Regarding discrimination.

Included in those grant assurances is Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. 2000d, and its implementing regulations, that provide that no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex or creed be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any programs or activity that receives federal financial assistance.

Executive Order 13166, "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency," reprinted at 65 FR 50121 (August 11, 2000), directs each federal agency to examine the services it provides and develop and implement a system by which persons with limited English Proficiency ("LEP") can meaningfully access the services.


The FTA requires that agencies that receive and use grants from FTA must demonstrate compliance with Title VI and Executive Order 13166, including the establishment of a process of documenting and handling complaints for any possible discrimination in addition to providing reasonable accommodations for individuals with LEP through the use of available staff and language cards.

PROGRAM DETAILS

The construction of the RITC is complete. However, FTA requires that there be a close-out procedure for the grants that were utilized. This close-out procedure requires that there be on file with FTA a formal Title VI Program with a process for documenting and handling complaints for any possible discrimination. Attached as Exhibit 1 is a proposed Title VI Program. Because FTA will not process the close-out documents for these grants without a Commission-approved Title VI Program on file, Staff has prepared this Title VI Program, which satisfies the FTA requirements.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff seeks Commission approval of the attached Title VI Program.

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Introduction

Title VI Complaint Procedures

The following complaint procedures and complaint form are posted on BGPAA's website at www.BobHopeAirport.com. Written Title VI complaints received by airport personnel are forwarded to the Title VI Coordinator. The coordinator maintains a record of the complaints, conducts a preliminary review and attempt at resolution, and forwards a copy of the complaint and a description of the resolution efforts to the FTA within 15 days of receipt. The following are our complaints procedures:

These procedures are for complaints of discrimination, other than employment discrimination by the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority (BGPAA). They apply to discrimination by airport employees, contractors, concessionaires, lessees, or tenants of the Airport, or at Airport facilities based upon race, creed, color, national origin, or gender, including but not necessarily limited to complaint under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987. They cover any program or activity administered by BGPAA.

Any person who feels that he or she has been subjected to discrimination on the basis of race, creed, color, national origin, or gender has the right to file a complaint with the Airport. These procedures do not deny or limit the right of a complainant to file a formal complaint with an outside agency, such as the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) Federal Transit Agency (FTA) to seek private legal counsel regarding discrimination. Complaints must be filed within (90) day after the discriminatory event, must be in writing, and must be delivered to:

If a complainant wishes to file a complaint directly with the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), the complainant has 180-days to file his or her complaint.

If a complaint is initially made by phone, it must be supplemented with a written complaint within 90 days. Accommodation will be provided upon request to individuals unable to file written complaint due to a disability.

Once a Title VI complaint is made, the Title VI Coordinator will begin investigating the complaint. The Title VI Coordinator's investigation may include but is not limited to:

interviewing complainant, witnesses, or other involved parties to clarify the issues, obtain additional information, and determine if informal resolution might be possible.

Once the investigation is complete the Title VI Coordinator will respond accordingly to the complainant: A letter of finding (LOF) or a closure letter.

A LOF summarizes the allegations and interviews regarding the alleged incident and, explains whether any disciplinary action, additional training of the staff member or other action will occur. If the complainant wishes to appeal the decision, she/he has 10 days after the date of the letter or the LOF to do so.

A closure letter summarizes the allegations and states that there was not a Title VI violation and that the case will be closed. The letter may be drafted by BGPAAs' legal counsel, and if appropriate, BGPAA's counsel may administratively close the complaint. If this is the case, BGPAA will notify the complainant of the action as soon as possible.

Public Participation Plan

The BGPAA public participation plan will ensure that early and continuous opportunities for the public to be involved in the identification of social, economic, and environmental impacts of proposed transportation decisions.

Summary of Outreach Efforts Made Since Last Title VI Submission

This is the first Title VI for the Federal Transit Administration.

Language Assistance Plan

Limited English Proficiency Plan has been prepared to address the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority's responsibilities as a recipient of federal financial assistance as they relate to the needs of individuals with limited English proficiency language skills. The plan has been prepared in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. 2000d, et seq, and its implementing regulations, which state that no person shall be subjected to discrimination on the basis of race, color or national origin.

<u>Limited English Proficiency</u> - A person who does not speak English as his or her primary language and who has a limited ability to read, write, speak or understand English may be a limited English Proficient person.

<u>Language Assistance</u> - Language assistance can include interpretation, which means oral or spoken transfer of a message from on language into another language.

<u>Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964</u> prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, and national origin in programs and activities receiving federal financial assistance. One critical concern addressed by Title VI is the language barrier that Limited English Proficiency (LEP) persons face with respect to accessing information about and using transit service. Agencies that receive federal funds must ensure that this group has adequate access to the agency's programs and activities, including public participation opportunities.

Executive Order 13166, titled "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency," forbids funding recipients from "restricting an individual in any way in the enjoyment of any advantage or privilege enjoyed by others receiving any service, financial aid, or other benefit under the program," or from "utilizing criteria or methods of administration which have the effect of subjecting individuals to discrimination because of their race, color, or national origin, or have the effect of defeating or substantially impairing accomplishment of the objectives of the program as respects to individuals of a particular race, color, or national origin."

<u>FTA Circular 4702.1B</u> was developed by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and details the administrative and reporting requirements for recipients of FTA financial assistance to comply with Title VI and related executive orders including on LEP.

The United States Department of Transportation (DOT) published guidance that directed its recipients to ensure meaningful access to the benefits, services, information, and other important portions of their programs and activities for LEP customers. Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority (BGPAA) language assistance plan (LAP) includes two sections. The first section consists of a four factor analysis and implementation plan that complies with the requirements of DOT LEP guidance. The second section of this document discusses the results of the Four-Factor Analysis and the implementation of the Language Assistance Plan.

Improving Access for People with Limited English Proficiency

In order to ensure meaningful access to programs and activities, BGPAA uses the information obtained in a Four Factor Analysis to determine the specific language services that are appropriate. This analysis helps BGPAA to determine if it communicates effectively with LEP persons and informs language access planning. The **Four Factor Analysis** is a local assessment that considers:

- 1. The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served or likely to be encountered by the Agency's Program;
- 2. The frequency with which LEP persons come into contact with the Agency's Program;
- 3. The nature and importance of the Agency's Program in people's lives; and
- 4. The resources available to the Agency's Program for LEP outreach, as well as the costs associated with that outreach.

Factor 1: The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served or likely to be encountered by the Agency's Program.

Community Statistic for BGPAA's service area would include Los Angeles County and all of San Fernando Valley and Santa Clarita Valley.

A brief survey of airport and airline employees indicated very few requests for language assistance were actually received. In most cases, the language that the Airport receives requests for assistance is Spanish.

Factor 3: The nature and importance of the Agency's Program in people's lives.

To promote a positive, friendly and safe environment.

Factor 4: The resources available to the Agency's Program for LEP outreach, as well as the costs associated with that outreach.

We have Airport staff that is fluent in various languages. The Agency's program will initially utilize airport staff and manpower to accommodate individuals that have limited English proficiency.

Language Assistance Measures

The results of the Four Factor Analysis concluded that despite LA County having a rich LEP community, the Hollywood Burbank Airport encounters very limited LEP individuals and the ones that do require any assistance usually need a Spanish interpreter. The BGPAA staff will take reasonable steps to provide the opportunity for meaningful access to LEP clients who can have difficulty communicating in English.

- 1. The following resources will be available to accommodate LEP persons using airport Staff:
 - Volunteer interpreters of the airport staff for the following languages:

•	Spanish	French I	Italian	Vietnamese	Korean
•	Tagalog	Bangali	Hindi	Indonesian	Urdu
•	Punjabi	Japanese	Portuguese	German	Arabic

- Mandarin Chinese
- 2. BGPAA will translate the following vital documents into Spanish by June 30, 2016.
 - Civil Rights Notice
 - Complaint Form
 - Complaint Procedures
- 3. BGPAA staff will provide notice to the public of our language assistance measures by:
 - Posting notice of LEP plan and the availability of interpretation or translation services free of charge in languages LEP persons would understand.
 - All BGPAA staff will be provided with "I Speak" cards to assist in identifying the language interpretation needed if the occasion arises.
 - All BGPAA staff will be informally surveyed periodically on their experience concerning any contacts with LEP persons during the previous year.
 - When the BGPAA sponsors an informational meeting or event, an advanced public notice of the event should be published including special needs related to offering a translator (LEP) or interpreter (sign language for hearing impaired individuals). Additionally, a staff person may greet participants as they arrive. By informally engaging participants in conversation it is possible to gauge each attendee's ability to speak and understand English. Although translation may not be able to be provided at the event it will help identify the need for future events.

Staff Training

The following training will be provided to all staff:

- Information on the Title VI Policy and LEP responsibilities.
- Description of language assistance services offered to the public.
- Use of the "I Speak" cards.
- Documentation of language assistance requests.
- How to handle a potential Title VI/LEP complaint.
- Who to contact language translation

All contractors or subcontractors performing work for the BGPAA will be required to follow the Title VI/LEP guidelines.

Translation of Documents

Due to the limited number of individuals that require and/or need LEP assistance, the BGPAA is electing to only have the vital documents, outlined in Section 2, translated and does not have a formal outreach procedure in place. Translation resources have been identified and are limited. However, when and if the need arises for LEP outreach, the BGPAA will consider the following:

Any document, or scheduled meetings, for which the target audience is expected to include LEP individuals, Staff will consider having the documents, meeting notices fliers, and agendas printed in an alternative language based on the known LEP population.

Safe Harbor Provision

The FTA Circular 4702.1B states, "DOT has adopted DOJ's Safe Harbor Provision, which outlines circumstances that can provide a "safe harbor" for recipients regarding translation of written materials for LEP populations. The Safe Harbor Provision stipulates that, if a recipient provides written translation of vital documents for each eligible LEP language group that constitutes five percent (5%) or 1,000 persons, whichever is less, of the total population of persons eligible to be served or likely to be affected or encountered, then such action will be considered strong evidence of compliance with the recipient's written translation obligations. Translation of non-vital documents, if needed, can be provided orally. If there are fewer than 50 persons in a language group that reaches the five percent (5%) trigger, the recipient is not required to translate vital written materials but should provide written notice in the primary language of the LEP language group of the right to receive competent oral interpretation of those written materials, free of cost.

These safe harbor provisions apply to the translation of written documents only. They do not affect the requirement to provide meaningful access to LEP individuals through competent oral interpreters where oral language services are needed and are reasonable. A recipient may determine, based on the Four Factor Analysis, that even though a language group meets the threshold specified by the Safe Harbor Provisions, written translation may not be an effective means to provide language assistance measures. For example, a recipient may determine that a large number of persons in that language group have low literacy skills in their native language and therefore require oral interpretation. In such cases, background documentation regarding the determination shall be provided to FTA in the Title VI Program.

Although BGPAA strives to adhere to the Safe Harbor Provision, BGPAA operates from a limited budget, thus making it financially prohibitive to translate all vital documents into every language that constitutes the lesser of 5% or 1,000 persons of the total population of persons eligible to be served or likely to encounter our transportation services. Given that, BGPAA mostly receives requests for language assistance from Spanish Speaking individuals, necessary documents are translated into Spanish. BGPAA will provide oral interpretation services to other languages besides Spanish.

Monitoring and Updating the LEP Plan

The BGPAA will update the LEP Plan as required. At a minimum, the plan will be reviewed and updated when data from the 2010 U.S. Census is available, or when it is clear that higher concentrations of LEP are present in the BGPAA area. Updates will include the following:

- The number of documented LEP person contacts encountered annually.
- How the needs of LEP persons have been addressed.
- Determination of the current LEP population in the Airport area.
- Determination as to whether the need for translation services has changed.
- Determination whether local language assistance programs have been effective and sufficient to meet the need.
- Determine whether the BGPAA's financial resources are sufficient to fund language assistance resources needed.
- Determine whether the BGPAA fully complies with the goals of this LEP Plan.
- Determine whether complaints have been received concerning the Authority's failure to meet the needs of LEP individuals.
- Maintain a Title VI complaint log, including LEP to determine issues and basis of complaints.

Dissemination of the BGPAA LEP Plan

- Post signs at conspicuous and accessible locations notifying LEP persons of the LEP Plan and how to access language services.
- State on agendas and public notices in the language those LEP persons would understand that documents are available in that language upon request at (818) 840-8840.

Title VI Equity Analysis

An Environmental Assessment was conducted in 2010 and concluded that the construction of the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center is not likely to be controversial on environmental grounds and there was no known organized opposition to the project. The proposed Project was consistent with the plans, goals, and policies of the City of Burbank and development of the proposed Project has been undertaken in coordination with the city. The construction project was also not likely to directly, indirectly, or cumulatively create a significant impact on the human environment.
