a. Award of Waste Hauling and

Recycling Services Contract

Staff reported that the Authority's waste hauling and recycling needs are currently being met on a month to month basis by Athens Environmental Services, Inc. ("Athens") for properties in Burbank and by Republic Services, Inc. for properties in Los Angeles. As of

March 1, 2019, Athens raised the combined approximate average monthly cost for these services

to \$23,181.33 (the amount fluctuates with the volume of on-call pick-ups driven by Maintenance Department

projects).

Over the past several years, the provision of waste hauling and recycling services for the Authority has changed hands through mergers, acquisitions and contract assignment. Beyond industry consolidation of the service provider market, the California Legislature has enacted several waste diversion and recycling laws that require providers to become compliant with.

On August 28, 2018, through the Authority's PlanetBids e-procurement website, Staff issued a Request for Proposals ("RFP") for waste hauling and recycling services. Despite significant interest in the RFP, as evidenced by several firms attending a mandatory pre-proposal meeting, only Athens submitted a proposal. Staff rejected the sole proposal.

Staff conducted follow-up interviews with firms that declined to provide a proposal. Based on these interviews, Staff amended the Scope of Services and a revised RFP was issued. A pre-proposal meeting for the second solicitation was held and five firms attended.

From the five attendees, two proposals were received, evaluated, and the proposed monthly fees, not including on-call services, were as follows:

- 1. American Reclamation, Inc. \$11,467.24
- 2. Athens Environmental Services, Inc. \$17,582.83

Staff recommended that the Committee recommend to the Commission, award of a proposed Waste Hauling and Recycling Services Agreement to American Reclamation, Inc. for a three-year term commencing July 1, 2019, and extending to June 30, 2022, at a monthly cost of \$11,467.24 with an allowance for on-call services of \$1,500 per month. The contract also contains two one-year extension options at the Authority's discretion, prices subject to adjustment.

Following the presentation, Staff and Mr. Mark Border, of American Reclamation, responded to various questions from the Committee. Commissioner Devine moved approval of Staff's recommendation, seconded by Commissioner Brown.

b. Award of Janitorial Services Contract

Staff recommended that the Committee recommend to the Commission that it enter into a Janitorial Services Agreement ("Agreement") with Diverse Facility Solutions, Inc. ("DFS") for a three-year period, with two one-year extension options, for a fixed price of \$1,663,620 annually (\$138,635 monthly), excluding supplies, which will be billed monthly at an actual cost basis. Supplies are estimated to cost approximately \$16,700 per month.

Staff developed a Request for Proposals ("RFP") that incorporates all areas of the Airport covered under the current Agreement. The cleaning frequencies identified in the scope of work were enhanced to address the anticipated changes in passenger volumes and airport operational needs.

 Agreement – Diverse
 Facility Solutions, Inc. With the recommendation of the Operations and Development Committee at its meeting immediately preceding the Commission meeting with a unanimous vote (3–0), Staff presented to the Commission a request for approval of an Award of Extension to the Janitorial Services Agreement with Diverse Facility Solutions, Inc. ("DFS"), on a month-tomonth basis for a period not to exceed three months at the current fixed monthly cost of \$93,132, excluding supplies. Supplies will continue to be billed monthly at the cost of \$16,700 per month.

Staff reviewed for the Commission the previous Request for Proposal process undertaken at the May 6th Operations Committee meeting. Staff was requested to provide additional

information and clarification on the evaluation of the short-listed firms. Staff then undertook a process by which best and final offers ("BAFO") were requested from the four short-listed firms which Staff believes addresses the comments and concerns of the Committee.

The BAFO process is expected to be completed prior to the end of the fiscal year. However, as the existing contract with DFS will expire at the end of May, a short-term month-to-month extension with DFS was prepared, not to exceed three months of the existing contract at its current pricing, to allow Staff the necessary time to complete the BAFO process.

b. Approval of Agreements for Verdugo Fire Communications System Upgrades With the recommendation of the Operations and Development Committee at its meeting immediately preceding the Commission meeting, with a vote of (2–0, one abstention). Staff presented to the Commission for approval the following items to complete the Airport Fire Department's communication system upgrades in conjunction with Verdugo Fire Communications equipment and systems upgrades: (1) Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") with the City of Glendale in the amount of \$15,182 for the Authority's share of the Phoenix G2 alerting system upgrade to the Northrup Grumman System Command Point Computer-Aided Dispatch system; (2) Contract with US Digital Designs, Inc. in the amount of \$46,426 for the replacement of the station alerting system to the Phoenix G2 system with

an optional annual service agreement fee of \$3,762 that becomes available eighteen months after installation; (3) Contract with Bergelectric Corporation in the amount of \$31,054 for installation of the station alerting system; and (4) Contract with Presidio Networked Solutions Group LLC in the amount of \$58,103 for the acquisition and installation of replacement Mobile Data Terminals ("MDT") and associated data network to support the MDTs in the Airport Fire Department's vehicles.

In August 2017, the Verdugo Fire Communication System made the decision, with the approval of the Glendale City Council, to upgrade their 30-year-old computer-aided dispatch system to the Northrup Grumman Command Point Computer Aided Dispatch System. As a result, all participating agencies within the Verdugo Fire Communication system, of which the Authority Fire Department is included, are required to upgrade their station alerting systems and MDTs, as well as their connectivity and data point systems.

The total cost of the upgrades for the interoperability within the Verdugo System, not including the optional annual service agreement fee for the station alerting system equipment, is \$150,765.

Appropriations in the amount of \$350,000 were included in the adopted FY 2019 budget for this project. Approximately \$158,066 has been utilized for the acquisition of the replacement Motorola 8000 handheld portable radios and replacement APX Consolettes. The total proposed award of contracts of \$150,765 is within the remaining appropriations of \$191,934.

7. ITEMS FOR COMMISSION DISCUSSION

a. Project Delivery Method –
 Replacement Passenger
 Terminal Project

Staff presented to the Commission a report on the Progressive Design Build project delivery method for the Replacement Passenger Terminal ("RPT") Project at Hollywood Burbank Airport. At the May 10, 2019, meeting of the RPT Ad Hoc Committee ("Committee"), Staff discussed this item with the Committee and received direction to move this item to the Commission for its consideration.

Delivery Method is a term used to describe the contracting process and contracting structure by which design and construction firms are selected in order to deliver and facilitate the development of the RPT and the associated components of the project.

At the RPT Ad Hoc Committee meeting, the Financial Advisor and Financial Feasibility Consultants, along with Staff, reviewed several delivery method alternatives, such as: (i) Design Bid Build; (ii) Construction Manager at Risk; (iii) Progressive Design Build; (iv) Lump Sum Design Build; (v) Public Private Partnership (P3); and (vi) Hybrid.

Each method presents variable levels of scope control, cost control, risk assumption, and completion schedule expectations. The considerations for recommending a preferred delivery method for the Project to the Commission are: (i) ability to maintain program cost within the established program funding parameters, and; (ii) ability to define scope and manage design development and program cost with inputs from designers and the builder.

At the May 10th meeting of the RPT Ad Hoc Committee, based on the priorities set forth above, and based on the interests of Airport tenants, users, and the public, Staff and consultants recommended to the Committee that the Progressive Design Build Delivery method be selected. With the recommendation of the RPT Ad Hoc Committee, Staff sought the approval of the Commission of the same.

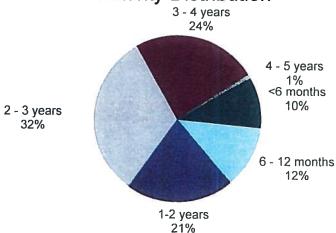

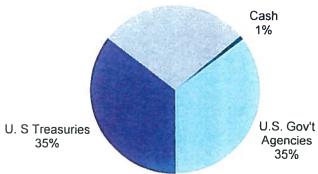
Maturity Distribution

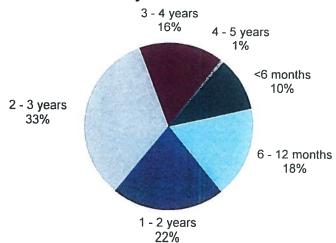




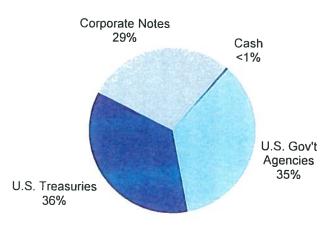

NOTE (5) - Rental Receipts - Other Buildings

Other Buildings rental receipts are under budget FYTD March due to the timing of receipts. Accrual basis Other Building receipts are \$343,780 ahead of budget FYTD March.

NOTE (6) - Ground Transportation

This category consists of off-airport access fees and TNC activity. Ground Transportation receipts exceed the budget FYTD March. Accrual basis ground transportation receipts are \$515,004 ahead of budget FYTD March primarily due to TNC activity.

NOTE (7) - Other Receipts

FYTD March Other Receipts include a rent deposit of \$329,098 from Star Aviation for the lease of Hangar 22 which was awarded by the Commission in October 2018 and an insurance reimbursement of \$146,475 to repair the roof of Hangar 2 which was damaged by the wind last fiscal year (April 2018). In February, the Airport received an insurance reimbursement of \$290,330 which was refunded in March to Deluxe for their relocation to another facility while repair was performed on the roof of Hangar 2. Accrual basis Other Receipts are \$398,852 ahead of budget FYTD March.

NOTE (8) - Investment Receipts - Treasurer

This line item represents cash received from the investment of funds. These receipts fluctuate in response to interest rate and portfolio balance changes and the timing of coupon payments and individual investment maturities and sales. Accrual basis investment income, including the interest earned on loans to Rent-A-Car Companies, exceeds the budget by \$1,035,518 FYTD March.

NOTE (9) - Cash Disbursements from Operations

Overall operating disbursements are favorably under budget FYTD March. On an accrual basis operating disbursements are favorably within budget parameters. See additional information on operating disbursements in notes 10 through 16.

NOTE (10) - Administrative Supplies & Costs

This line item includes office supplies, printing, postage and delivery, office equipment service and lease, recruiting, membership, uniform, Commission meeting, conference and training costs.

NOTE (11) - Operating Supplies & Maintenance

This line item includes utilities, fuel, general repairs and maintenance, landscaping, supplies and telephone costs.

NOTE (12) - Contractual Operating Costs

This line item includes various contractual operating costs such as ARFF services, janitorial services, systems and vehicle repair, parking operations and the TBI Airport Management contract costs.

NOTE (13) – <u>Contractual Professional Services</u>

This line item includes various professional services such as legal, auditing, noise, financial and insurance.

General Comments

The debt service on the 2012 Revenue Bonds and the repayment to the Authority of the loans to the Rent-A-Car Companies ("RACs") is payable from Customer Facility Charges ("CFCs") and Facility Rents. Under the terms of the Bond Indenture, as amended, all CFCs collected subsequent to July 1, 2014 are remitted to the Bond Trustee for the 2012 Bond debt service.

On July 1, 2014, the terms and conditions of the Non-Exclusive Concession and Lease Agreement with the respective Rent-A-Car Companies became effective, including the collection of Facility Rent.

Note (1) - <u>Customer Facility Charge ("CFC") Receipts</u>

CFCs of \$6 per day per transaction, up to a maximum of five days, are collected and applied to the 2012 Bond debt service. CFCs received FYTD March exceeded the budget due to better than expected car rental activity.

Note (2) - Facility Rent

Facility Rent exceeds the budget FYTD March due to the timing of receipts.

Note (3) - Loan Principal Repayments to the Authority

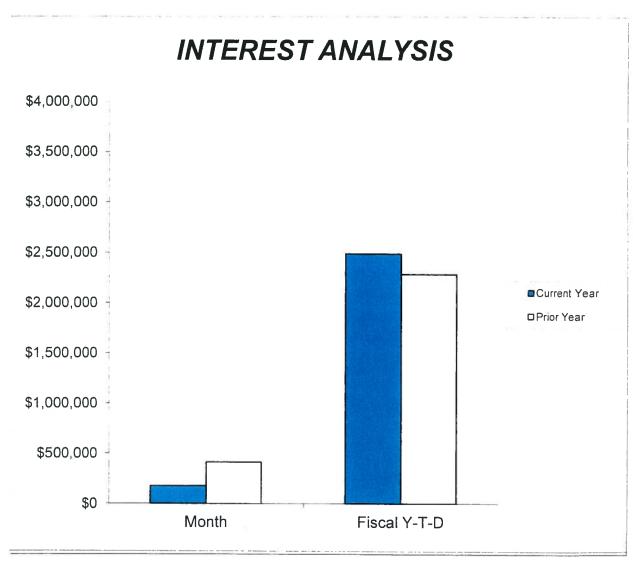
Repayments of the loan principal to the Authority from the Rent-A-Car Companies exceed the budget FYTD March due to timing of receipts. The principal portion of the payment will be deposited as reimbursement to the Authority's Facility Development Fund. The interest portion of the loan repayment is recorded as investment income.

Note (4) - Net RITC / ConRAC Facility Payments and Collections

A positive amount in this line indicates that cash has been received above the required payment obligations. At fiscal year-end, upon conclusion of the required reconciliation, any excess surplus accumulated will be evaluated and applied toward the allowed uses under the terms and conditions of the Non-Exclusive Concession and Lease Agreement with the Rent-A-Car Companies.

In the event of a shortfall of receipts to meet the required payment obligations (i.e., CFC collections perform under budget projections), the Authority holds the right to adjust the Facility Rent paid by the rental car companies on a 30-day notice.

AIRLINE SCHEDULE ANALYSIS

Airlines serving Hollywood Burbank Airport have notified Staff of changes in services, fleet mix, and scheduled operating times. This report reflects the changes in detail below and on the attached Schedule Change Analysis.

AMERICAN AIRLINES

Effective June 2, 2019, American Airlines will be making a schedule adjustment by adding one Saturday round-trip flight to Phoenix a week.

SOUTHWEST AIRLINES

As previously announced, Southwest Airlines will be increasing its air service with the introduction of one daily nonstop flight to Nashville, Tennessee, effective June 9, 2019. This schedule change includes an increase in service to other markets served by Southwest. The number of scheduled flight changes in arrivals and departures represents a net increase of 60 round-trip flights per week.

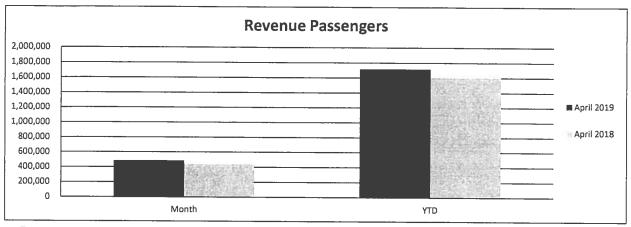

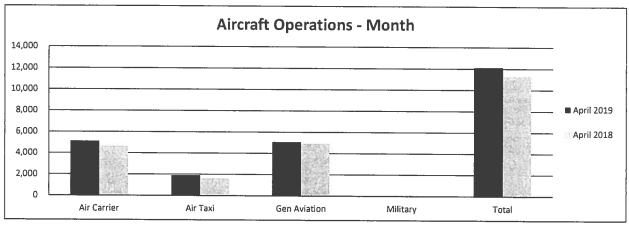

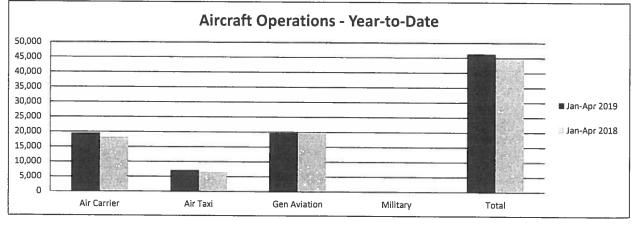
