- d. AMENDMENT TO CONDITIONAL CONSENT TO ASSIGNMENT DEVELOPMENT GROUND LEASE – AVJET CORPORATION. A staff report is included in the agenda packet. At its meeting on July 19, 2021, the Finance and Administration Committee unanimously voted (3–0) to recommend that the Commission approve an amendment to the Conditional Consent to Assignment of Lease for transfer of Hangar 25 from AvJet Corporation to Harbor Freight Tools, USA. The purpose of the amendment is to provide additional time for the completion of certain repairs as required under the Purchase and Sales Agreement between AvJet and Harbor Freight Tools.
- e. UPDATE TO LOS ANGELES CITY COUNCILMEMBERS ON RESPONSE TO SOUTHERN SAN FERNANDO VALLEY AIRPLANE NOISE TASK FORCE RECOMMENDATIONS LETTER TO FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION ON FLIGHT PATH SHIFTS. Staff seeks the Commission's authorization for Executive Director Frank Miller to send Los Angeles City Councilmembers Paul Krekorian, Paul Koretz, Nithya Raman, and Nury Martinez the attached letter updating them on the Authority's response to recommendations of the Southern San Fernando Valley Airplane Noise Task Force (Task Force) that are specific to the Authority. Additionally, Staff seeks the Commission's authorization for President Devine to send the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) a letter reiterating the Authority's prior requests that the shift in flight paths be addressed

- 6. ITEMS FOR COMMISSION APPROVAL
 - a. AWARD OF PURCHASE ORDER AIRPORT OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT PORTABLE RADIO REPLACEMENT. A staff report is included in the agenda packet. At its meeting on July 19, 2021, the Operations and Development Committee voted unanimously (3–0) to recommend that the Commission approve the acquisition of replacement interoperable radio equipment from Motorola Solutions. The proposed acquisition replaces the Airport Operations Department's current 17 handheld Motorola portable radios, which have reached the end of their useful life, with the Motorola APX 8000 series radios and ancillary accessories at a total cost of \$122,699.95.
 - b. AWARD OF LICENSE AGREEMENT COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. A staff report is included in the agenda packet. Subject to the recommendation of the Operations and Development Committee at its meeting immediately preceding the Commission meeting, Staff seeks a Operations and Development Committee recommendation to the Commission to award a License Agreement to the County of Los Angeles for the purpose of conducting a temporary free COVID-19 vaccination clinic within the Airport passenger terminal building commencing August 16, 2021 through August 15, 2022.
 - c. ALLIED UNIVERSAL CONTRACT AMENDMENT. A staff report is included in the agenda packet. Subject to the recommendation of the Operations and Development Committee at its meeting immediately preceding the Commission meeting, Staff seeks approval from the Commission for a proposed Amendment No. 3 to the Professional Services Agreement ("PSA") with Universal Protection Service LP, dba Allied Universal, to increase the appropriations for airport security and traffic controls services. In October 2020, the Commission approved a one-year extension of this PSA, in the amount of \$974,413, based on the projected reduced traffic volume due to the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the contract is set to expire on October 31, 2021. However with the rapid return of leisure travel, vehicular and passenger traffic has increased significantly. In order to maintain consistent flow of traffic and ensure pedestrian safety on the Airport roads, Staff is recommending that the current appropriation be increased by a not-to-exceed amount of \$125,000 to accommodate additional staffing, which would result in a total contract amount of \$1,099,413 for the extension period ending October 31, 2021.

General Comments

The Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements ("Schedule") represents the cash basis activity for the month and fiscal year-to-date ("FYTD") compared to the allocation of the annual adopted budget.

The Schedule consists of two sections: Operating Activity and Facility Improvement/Noise Mitigation Transactions. Receipts are shown as positive amounts and disbursements as negative amounts. Favorable budget variances are shown as positive amounts and unfavorable variances as negative amounts. Because this Schedule is on a cash basis, cash timing differences may contribute to budget variances.

The Operating Activity receipts include charges for services (parking, landing fees and concessions), tenant rents, fuel flowage fees, other revenues and investment receipts. The Operating Activity disbursements include costs of services, materials, contracts, personnel and debt service.

Facility Improvement / Noise Mitigation Transactions represent the activity for the Authority's capital program, which consists of the Sound Insulation Program and Other Facility Improvement Program Projects.

The FY 2021 Capital Program expenditures are primarily funded by the following sources:

- FAA-approved Passenger Facility Charge ("PFC") program receipts/reserves;

- Grants;

Operating Revenues

The notes below provide additional information regarding the performance results detailed in the "Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements."

A Supplemental Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements reflecting the activities related to the Series 2012 Bond debt service and repayment to the Authority of the loans provided to the Rent-A-Car Companies ("RACs") for the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center / Consolidated Rental Car Facility is also presented.

Due to the uncertainty caused by the impacts of COVID-19 to the aviation industry, the Authority continued its conservative outlook on passenger activity recovery into FY 2021. The Authority's Adopted FY 2021 budget was based on the following quarterly activity assumptions:

- Q1 (July -September): a reduction of 85%
- Q2 (October December): a reduction of 75%
- Q3 (January March): a reduction of 65%
- Q4 (April June): a reduction of 50%

Passengers were down 75.14% FYTD May when compared to pre-COVID levels and down 50.76% when compared to May 2019 (pre-COVID). This result was slightly below the Q4 budgeted assumption of a passenger reduction of 50.00% for the month and below the blended reduction of 70.45% for the first eleven months of the fiscal year. Although, the overall passenger activity performance of the first eleven months was below the budgeted assumptions, the FYTD May 2021 financial performance remains slightly positive.

Additionally, the Adopted FY 2021 Budget includes the use of \$16.1 million in CARES Act Grant Funds for the reimbursement of bond debt service and personnel costs to help supplement the reduction in revenues due to declined passenger activity.

NOTE (1) – Cash Receipts from Operations

Cash receipts from operations exceed the budget FYTD May. On an accrual basis, operating revenues exceed the budget FYTD May by \$1,632,706. See notes 2 through 8 for additional information regarding operating receipts.

NOTE (2) - Landing/Fuel Fees

Landing Fees are based on landed weight of the aircraft. Fuel fees are charged at a rate of \$0.05 a gallon to non-signatory air carriers for fuel loaded at BUR. On an accrual basis, Landing Fees combined with Fuel Flowage Fees exceed the budget by \$375,127 FYTD May. The Authority deferred landing fees for signatory airlines for April 2020 through June 2020. This deferral was paid back by the airlines in equal installments during the first half of FY 2021, which was reflected in the actual monthly cash receipts, but not in the monthly FY 2021 budgeted amounts as these amounts were accrued as part of FY 2020 activity.

NOTE (3) - Parking Fees

Parking fee revenues performed above the FYTD budget forecast. Accrual basis Parking Fees are \$527,594 ahead of budget FYTD May.

NOTE (4) – Rental Receipts - Terminal Building

Terminal Building rental receipts are under budget FYTD May. The Authority deferred Terminal Building rental fees for signatory airlines for April 2020 through June 2020. This deferral was paid back by the airlines in equal installments during the first half of FY 2021, which was reflected in the actual monthly cash receipts, but not in the monthly FY 2021 budgeted amounts as these amounts were accrued as part of FY 2020 activity. Accrual basis Terminal Building rents are under budget by \$1,074,123 FYTD May due to the continued economic relief extended by the Authority to the concessionaires from July 2020 to June 2021.

NOTE (5) - Rental Receipts - Other Buildings

Other Buildings rental receipts exceed the budget FYTD May partially due to the timing of receipts. Accrual basis Other Building rents are \$832,385 ahead of budget FYTD May due to CPI adjustments and additional lease revenue.

NOTE (6) - Ground Transportation

This category consists of off-airport access fees and TNC activity. Accrual basis Ground Transportation receipts are under budget by \$104,484 FYTD May.

NOTE (7) - Other Receipts

This category consists primarily of filming, TSA LEO reimbursements, fingerprint/badge renewal fees, noise fees, and access fees. FYTD May Other Receipts include a security deposit of \$222,242 from TEM Enterprises operating as Avelo Aviation and a security deposit of \$118,737 from Innova Aviation, LLC. Accrual basis Other Receipts are \$299,260 ahead of budget FYTD May.

NOTE (8) – Investment Receipts - Treasurer

This line item represents cash received from the investment of funds. These receipts fluctuate in response to interest rate and portfolio balance changes, the timing of coupon payments and individual investment maturities. Accrual basis investment income exceeds the budget by \$776,947 FYTD May.

NOTE (9) – <u>Cash Disbursements from Operations</u>

Overall operating disbursements are favorably under budget FYTD May. On an accrual basis operating disbursements are favorably within budget parameters. See additional information on operating disbursements in notes 10 through 16.

NOTE (10) - Administrative Supplies & Costs

This line item includes office supplies, printing, postage and delivery, office equipment service and lease, recruiting, membership, uniform, Commission meeting, conference and training costs.

NOTE (11) -	Operating Supplies & Maintenance
	This line item includes utilities, fuel, general repairs and maintenance, landscaping, supplies and telephone costs.
NOTE (12) -	Contractual Operating Costs
	This line item includes various contractual operating costs such as ARFF services, janitorial services, systems and vehicle repair, parking operations and the TBI Airport Management contract costs.
NOTE (13) –	Contractual Professional Services
	This line item includes various professional services such as legal, auditing, noise, financial and insurance.
NOTE (14) –	Wages and Benefits
	Wages and Benefits consist of payroll and fringe benefit costs for the Airport Police officers, and include the impact of the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding effective February 2020. Wages and Benefits include overtime for film location services which are recovered through the related film revenue.
NOTE (15) –	Other Operating Costs
	This line item primarily includes public relations/advertising, air service retention, and license/permit fees.
NOTE (16) –	Parking Tax
	The 12% City of Burbank parking tax is paid quarterly for the prior three-month period. The next remittance, covering parking activity for the months of April, May and June, is due July 2021.
NOTE (17) –	Sound Insulation Program
	The Sound Insulation program is funded primarily through FAA Airport Improvement Program ("AIP") grants and and Passenger Facility Charge ("PFC") revenues. Staff is awaiting FAA's decision to award a noise discretionary grant, the receipt of which will facilitate the restart of the program.
NOTE (18) –	Other Facility Improvement Program Projects
	Other Facility Improvement Program Projects costs on a cash basis exceed the budget FYTD May by \$978,816 primarily due to payments for FY 2020 accrued costs for certain projects.
NOTE (19) –	FAA Grants – Other Facility Improvement Program Projects
	FAA Grants are budgeted to partially fund the ARFF Truck Replacement, Taxiway D7 Connector, G Infield and Delta Ramp Rehabilitation Project and the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Replacement Passenger Terminal.
NOTE (20) –	Other Grants
	Other grants represent federal grants, other than FAA AIP grants, and local grants that fund or partially fund the Ground Access Study.
NOTE (21) -	Passenger Facility Charge Receipts/Reserves
	A number of capital projects are budgeted to be funded or partially funded by Passenger Facility Charges, including the Airfield Maintenance Equipment and the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Replacement Passenger Terminal.

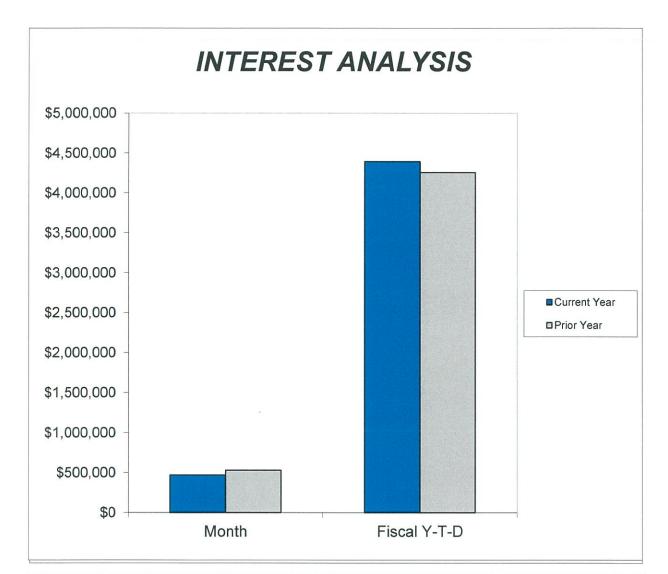

NOTE (22) - CARES Act Grant

The Authority has programmed approximately \$13.3 million of the \$21.1 million in CARES Act Grant funds to fund the 2015 Bond Debt Service and certain personnel costs for FY 2021. FYTD May reimbursements include FY 2020 costs of \$3.3 million related to the 2015 Bond debt service for April through June 2020 and certain personnel costs for May and June 2020. Also included are FY 2021 costs of \$10.2 million for the 2015 Bond Debt Service for the months of July 2020 through April 2021 and certain personnel costs for July to December 2020.

AMENDMENT TO CONDITIONAL CONSENT TO ASSIGNMENT DEVELOPMENT GROUND LEASE AVJET CORPORATION

SUMMARY

At its meeting on July 19, 2021, the Finance and Administration Committee ("Committee") voted unanimously (3–0) to recommend that the Commission approve a proposed amendment ("Amendment") to the Conditional Consent to Assignment of Lease, copy attached, for transfer of Hangar 25 from AvJet Corporation ("AvJet") to Harbor Freight Tools, USA ("Harbor Freight Tools"). The purpose of the Amendment is to provide additional time for the completion of certain repairs as required under the Purchase and Sales Agreement ("PSA") between AvJet and Harbor Freight Tools.

BACKGROUND

AvJet is a corporate jet management company that has operated at Hollywood Burbank Airport since 1978. On June 19, 2006, AvJet was granted a Development Ground Lease ("Lease") for the development and construction of Hangar 25 which was completed in December 2008. The hangar is located on the northwest quadrant of Hollywood Burbank Airport.

On March 21, 2016, the Commission approved a Consent to Assignment between AvJet and Jet Aviation Holdings USA Inc. ("Jet Aviation") as a result of a Stock Purchase Agreement which provided for a sale of AvJet to Jet Aviation. Under the Lease, the sale of stock constitutes a deemed assignment of the Lease. In addition to Hangar 25, with the acquisition of AvJet, Jet Aviation also operates in Hangars 6, 7, 7A and 7B as a sublessee of Atlantic Aviation.

On November 23, 2020, AvJet advised Staff that it executed a PSA with Harbor Freight Tools for the purchase of Hangar 25 and assumption of the Lease. Harbor Freight Tools is a privately held discount tool and equipment retailer headquartered in Calabasas, California. It is a multi-billion-dollar company that operates a chain of retail stores, as well as a mailorder and e-commerce business with 1,000 locations in 48 states. As the proposed assignee of the Lease, Harbor Freight Tools intends to house two corporate Stage 4 Gulfstream 650 aircraft.

On February 1, 2021, the Commission approved a Conditional Consent to Assignment of Lease for the transfer of Hangar 25 from AvJet to Harbor Freight Tools. On June 4, 2021, AvJet and Harbor Freight Tools advised staff that they desire to extend the term of the Conditional Consent to Assignment of Lease to allow for the completion of certain facility repairs to the hangar that are required to be completed prior to the closing of their

transaction. These repairs have been delayed due to the longer than anticipated lead time for components due to industry wide shortages experienced because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The proposed Amendment would extend the deadline for satisfaction of the conditions precedent to December 31, 2021. All other terms and conditions remain unchanged as previously approved.

DETAILS

Key components of the proposed assignment of the Lease are as follows:

<u>Use</u> :	Headquarters for Assignee's aircraft and flight department currently located at Van Nuys Airport
Premises:	Hangar 25
Commencement:	Upon satisfaction of the conditions listed in the Conditional Consent of Assignment of Lease.
Expiration:	June 30, 2031
<u>Rent</u> :	\$38,106.16 monthly/ \$457,273.92 annually
Adjustment:	Done annually at 120% of CPI. Fair market value assessment every five (5) years
Termination:	Authority has sole discretion to terminate upon six (6) months' notice
Others:	Tenant responsible for expenses related to occupancy including maintenance, utilities, insurances and applicable taxes

BUDGET IMPACT

The proposed Amendment is revenue neutral.

RECOMMENDATION

At its meeting on July 19, 2021, the Committee voted unanimously (3–0) to recommend that the Commission approve the proposed Amendment and authorize the President to execute same.

A. Landlord, Tenant and Assignee entered into a Conditional Consent to Assignment of Lease dated February 1, 2021 (the "Consent").

UPDATE TO LOS ANGELES CITY COUNCILMEMBERS ON RESPONSE TO SOUTHERN SAN FERNANDO VALLEY AIRPLANE NOISE TASK FORCE RECOMMENDATIONS LETTER TO FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION ON FLIGHT PATH SHIFTS

SUMMARY

Staff seeks the Commission's authorization for Executive Director Frank Miller to send Los Angeles City Councilmembers Paul Krekorian, Paul Koretz, Nithya Raman, and Nury Martinez the attached letter updating them on the Authority's response to recommendations of the Southern San Fernando Valley Airplane Noise Task Force (Task Force) that are specific to the Authority. Additionally, Staff seeks the Commission's authorization for President Devine to send the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) a letter reiterating the Authority's prior requests that the shift in flight paths be addressed.

BACKGROUND

On July 16, 2021, Los Angeles City Councilmembers Krekorian, Koretz, and Raman sent Executive Director Miller a letter seeking an update on the Authority's response to the Task Force's five recommendations that are specific to the Authority. The letter also demanded that the Authority submit an instrument flight procedure gateway request to the FAA, which was not a recommendation of the Task Force. A copy of this letter is attached as Exhibit A.

Staff and legal counsel have drafted a proposed response letter for the Commission's consideration. The proposed response letter is attached as Exhibit B. It is contemplated that the response letter will have three enclosures: (1) Executive Director Miller's August 17, 2020 letter to Task Force Chair Emily-Gabel Luddy and Vice Chair Paul Koretz regarding the Task Force's recommendations; (2) Commission Resolution No. 483 recommending to the FAA adjustments to the airport's takeoff flight patterns; and (3) Commission Resolution No. 488 establishing a citizen's advisory committee to provide recommendations on updates to the Authority's noise exposure map and noise compatibility program. Copies of these materials are respectively attached as Exhibit C, D, and E. It is also contemplated that a copy of the response letter and enclosures be sent to Los Angeles City Councilmember Nury Martinez for several reasons: she was a Task Force member too and her district is proximate to the airport; Resolution No. 488 requires that she be solicited for a recommendation on her district's representative on the citizen's advisory committee; and it is vital that she have an opportunity to participate in any discussions between the Authority and the City of Los Angeles about these issues.

Even before the Task Force was created, the Authority has been requesting the FAA to address the shift in flight paths. Staff and legal counsel have drafted a proposed letter to the FAA to reiterate that request. The proposed letter is attached as Exhibit F.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Commission authorize the following: (i) Executive Director Miller's issuance of the attached letter to Los Angeles City Councilmembers Krekorian, Koretz, Raman, and Martinez; and (2) President Devine's issuance of the attached letter to the FAA.

Dear Mr. Miller:

As you know, in recent years many of our constituents in the San Fernando Valley and the Santa Monica Mountains have experienced worsening noise impacts caused by flights departing from and landing at both Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR) and Van Nuys Airport (VNY). These changes have caused widespread public outrage and a massive spike in noise complaints regarding both airports.

In response to these concerns and complaints, the Southern San Fernando Valley Airplane Noise Task Force was created at the initiation of the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority ("BGPAA") and Los Angeles World Airports ("LAWA"). The mission of the Task Force was "to provide a forum for representatives of communities that are currently being affected, and those that could potentially be affected, by aircraft procedural and operational changes related to aircraft noise in the southern San Fernando Valley." The members of the Task Force received voluminous public comment, heard extensive expert presentations, and thoroughly debated and considered appropriate actions that the responsible parties could take. The Task Force agreed upon and approved sixteen recommendations directed at mitigating the noise impacts, and those recommendations were transmitted to the Federal Aviation Administration ("FAA"), BGPAA and LAWA for further action.

We are writing to follow upon the Task Force recommendations that were transmitted to BGPAA. Within the bylaws by which the Task Force was created, BGPAA expressly stated that it is "committed to continuing to work with the community, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and other stakeholders to help identify potential actions to reduce airplane noise annoyance without shifting noise to other noise-sensitive communities." Yet over a year has passed since the recommendations were approved and submitted to BGPAA, and the Task Force has not been informed of any progress on any of them.

By contrast, staff at Van Nuys Airport have been in continuous conversation with the Federal Aviation Administration as they work through similar recommendations and concerns, including the formation of a working group to review departure waypoints at VNY. Most recently, LAWA staff reported to the Los Angeles Board of Airport Commissioners (BOAC) on the progress that they are making with the FAA. Therefore, the undersigned Los Angeles City Councilmembers request your immediate follow-up to the Task Force recommendations below. It is our understanding that some or all of these recommendations may be taken up for consideration by the BGPAA at its board meeting next week, and we encourage the Board to treat these recommendations with the seriousness demanded by the degree of public concern and by the amount of work devoted to this process by Task Force members.

Recommendations from the Southern San Fernando Valley Airplane Noise Task Force Directed to BUR

Recommendation 4 - "Conduct a study to determine how to obtain the lowest noise levels from aircraft departures from Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR) Runway 15 and Van Nuys Airport (VNY) Runway 16R in the South San Fernando Valley communities through increased climb gradients, noise abatement departures profile (NADP) procedures, derated takeoff procedures, or a combination of the three alternatives." In their response to the Task Force Recommendations, BGPAA states the need to conduct a new Part 150 Study to determine how best to obtain the lowest noise levels from aircraft departures. Is there a current timeline for undertaking the new Part 150 study?

Recommendation 7 - "Provide for Instrument Flight Rules (IFR) procedures for aircraft to arrive all runways at Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR)." Has the BGPAA submitted a request for the FAA to publish these instrument approaches? If not, why not?

Recommendation 11 - "Increase enforcement of the existing voluntary curfew at Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR)." In order to increase enforcement of the existing voluntary curfew at Hollywood Burbank Airport, BGPAA's response to the Task Force stated that the Authority would consider including language that encourages general aviation operators to be cognizant of the voluntary curfew applicable to the scheduled air carriers, subject to consistency with the Airport Noise and Capacity Act. Has this item been considered by the BGPAA and if so, could you please provide an update?

Recommendation 14 - "Maintain and update when and if necessary the Noise Exposure Map (NEM) and Noise Compatibility Program (NCP) at Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR) and Van Nuys Airport (VNY) in order to continue to provide noise mitigation to all potentially eligible property owners and continue to monitor the aircraft operations and associated noise levels throughout the San Fernando Valley communities. The NCPs will specifically consider preferential runway use programs in a coordinated approach at both airports to determine whether more northerly flow provides noise benefits. The NCP at BUR will also analyze Runway 33 arrivals to limit the use of the flight path some operators use to arrive over the Santa Monica Mountains." In BGPAA's response to the Task Force Recommendations, BGPAA states, in order to provide noise mitigation to all potentially eligible property owners and to monitor aircraft noise and operations in the San Fernando Valley and Santa Monica Mountain communities, they noted a need for a new Part 150 study, similar to recommendation 4. Again, is there a current timeline for undertaking the new Part 150 study?

Recommendation 15 - "Create a Citizen's Advisory Committee at Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR) to address community concerns throughout the San Fernando Valley." The Task Force recommended creating a Citizens Advisory Committee at Hollywood Burbank Airport to address community concerns; BGPAA anticipated a final determination on this by the end of 2020. Can BUR provide an update regarding the formation of a CAC?

In addition, in order to provide relief to the communities impacted by the shift in the flight paths, BUR must immediately submit an Instrument Flight Procedure (IFP) Gateway request to the FAA regarding the exploration of any and all new waypoints and flight path options. The IFP Gateway request should also include exploration of any and all other technical improvements that would help disperse flights more equitably. Our request is that the waypoints qualify as fly by waypoints, as opposed to fly-over-waypoints, in order to reverse flight concentration over our communities. The Task Force assumed the limited role of developing these recommendations and working with both airports to find a path forward to address the concerns of our residents. That work is complete, yet we still wait for BUR to follow through with the recommendations and requests mentioned above.

Each of the undersigned Los Angeles City Councilmembers will continue to use all means available to ensure that our constituents' concerns are taken seriously and are effectively addressed. We expect an update from Hollywood Burbank Airport within 30 days, focusing on actions the airport is taking to address the recommendations put forth by the Task Force, along with the additional requests made in this letter. We look forward to hearing from you and stand ready to work with your staff and advocate with the FAA to protect the interests of our residents.

Re: Update on Noise Task Force Recommendations

Dear Councilmembers Krekorian, Koretz, and Raman:

The Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority (BGPAA), owner and operator of the Bob Hope Airport (commonly known as Hollywood Burbank Airport) (BUR), is in receipt of your July 16, 2021 correspondence seeking an update on BGPAA's actions to address the recommendations of the Southern San Fernando Valley Airplane Noise Task Force (Task Force). The requested update is provided below. This update is supplemental to my August 17, 2020 letter to Task Force Chair Emily Gabel-Luddy and Vice Chair Paul Krekorian, a copy of which is enclosed for your convenience.

Preliminarily, it is important to note that, four days before you sent your letter, the City of Los Angeles (LA) filed a lawsuit against BGPAA and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) in an effort to block the replacement terminal project. BGPAA remains committed to working with the community and other stakeholders to help identify potential actions to reduce airplane noise without shifting noise to other noise-sensitive communities. Unfortunately, LA's lawsuit places our agencies in an adversarial posture and hampers BGPAA's ability to communicate freely and work with LA to achieve the shared goal of airplane noise reduction. A speedy and amicable resolution of that lawsuit is in the best interest of our agencies, and the general public, because

the replacement terminal project will significantly enhance safety and has nothing to do with airplane noise.

Recommendation 4

As explained in my August 17, 2020 letter, BGPAA is addressing Recommendation 4 by undertaking a new Part 150 study once there has been sufficient operational and economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. Enplanement levels at BUR have improved in recent months, but are not yet to the point where it is appropriate to begin a new Part 150 study. Assuming a continuation of the current favorable trend, BGPAA anticipates that the new Part 150 study will commence next summer.

Recommendation 7

As explained in my August 17, 2020 letter, Recommendation 7 involves a federal action that can only be taken by the FAA. BGPAA will review and comment as appropriate on any additional instrument arrival and departure procedures that the FAA designs and implements for BUR.

Recommendation 11

As explained in my August 17, 2020 letter, BGPAA monitors all aircraft operations for compliance with the voluntary curfew and takes appropriate actions to encourage compliance when violations occur. Further, the "Noise Rules Summary" page on BGPAA's website contains the following notice: "The Authority has a long-standing voluntary curfew on scheduled arrivals and departures of passenger airline operations between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6:59 a.m. During those hours, airlines are strongly encouraged not to schedule any arrivals or departures." Additionally, the Authority will update its noise abatement best practices guide as part of the new Part 150 study and that update will include additional language encouraging general aviation operators to be cognizant of the applicable voluntary curfew.

Recommendation 14

As explained in my August 17, 2020 letter, BGPAA is addressing Recommendation 14 by undertaking a new Part 150 study once there has been sufficient operational and economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. Again, if the current favorable trend of enplanement levels at BUR continues, it is anticipated that the new Part 150 study will commence in next summer.

Recommendation 15

As explained in my August 17, 2020 letter, BGPAA is addressing Recommendation 15 by creating a Citizen's Advisory Committee. On December 14, 2020, the BGPAA Commission adopted Resolution No. 488 establishing the Hollywood Burbank Airport Citizen's Advisory

Committee to provide recommendations on updates to the Noise Exposure Map and Noise Compatibility Program as part of the new Part 150 study. The Committee will be comprised of three representatives from each of BGPAA's member cities and three representatives from LA (one each from Council Districts 2, 4 and 6). A copy of the resolution is enclosed for your convenience.

Demand for Instrument Flight Procedure Gateway Request

In addition to asking for an update on BGPAA's response to the Task Force recommendations, your letter demands that BGPAA "immediately submit an Instrument Flight Procedure (IFP) Gateway request to the FAA regarding the exploration of any and all new waypoints and flight path options." It is important to highlight that this contradicts the unanimous decision by the Task Force, including each of you, to oppose the implementation of waypoints in departure procedures south of BUR.

Please be advised that BGPAA has been requesting the FAA to address the shift in flight paths for several years. Moreover, on June 17, 2019, the BGPAA Commission adopted Resolution No. 483 recommending to the FAA implementation of alternative dispersal headings and optimization of ascent for flights departing BUR in order to achieve an equitable distribution of impacts on affected communities. A copy of that resolution is attached for your convenience. BGPAA will renew this request to the FAA.

Please also be advised that the FAA has awarded a contract for an Environmental Assessment for proposed amendments to two existing departure procedures at BUR. It is BGPAA's understanding that the FAA is considering the Task Force's recommendations as reasonable alternatives to the proposed amendments.

In closing, I wish to reiterate that BGPAA is mindful of airplane noise complaints and is supportive of measures that will equitably distribute impacts on affected communities. Also, because it appears that you did not send a copy of your correspondence to LA Councilmember Nury Martinez (who also served on the Task Force), I am providing one to her along with a copy of this response. Given that her district is proximate to BUR, and given that she will be solicited for a recommendation on her district's representative on the Hollywood Burbank Airport Citizen's Advisory Committee, it is vital that she have an opportunity to participate in any discussions between BGPAA and LA about these issues.

The Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority (BGPAA), owner and operator of the Bob Hope Airport (commonly known as Hollywood Burbank Airport), is in receipt of Chair Gabel-Luddy's May 28, 2020 correspondence transmitting the recommendations of the Southern San Fernando Valley Airplane Noise Task Force. I am writing to thank the Task Force for the significant work that led to the recommendations and to provide BGPAA's responses to the five items that are specific to our agency.

Recommendation 4

Conduct a study to determine how to obtain the lowest noise levels from aircraft departures from Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR) Runway 15 and Van Nuys Airport (VNY) Runway 16R in the South San Fernando Valley communities through increased climb gradients, noise abatement departures profile (NADP) procedures, de-rated takeoff procedures, or a combination of the three alternatives.

Responsible Entities: Federal Aviation Administration, Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority and Los Angeles World Airports Honorable Emily Gabel-Luddy Honorable Paul Krekorian August 17, 2020 Page 2

BGPAA Response: The geographical position, runway lengths, aircraft fleet mix, surrounding terrain, and nature of land uses in the departure areas would likely yield different results for best practices for noise abatement departure procedures at each airport. For that reason, such a study would best be conducted separately by each airport operator. In the case of BUR, this will be accomplished as part of a new Part 150 study. BGPAA intends to undertake a new Part 150 study once there has been sufficient operational and economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Recommendation 7

Provide for Instrument Flight Rules (IFR) procedures for aircraft to arrive all runways at Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR).

Responsible Entities: Federal Aviation Administration and Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority

BGPAA Response: BGPAA supports the publication of additional instrument arrival and departure procedures for the airport by the FAA. The design and implementation of any new instrument procedures is a federal action and would therefore require the FAA to undertake a review under the National Environmental Protection Act. BGPAA would review and comment as appropriate during the design of such procedures.

Recommendation 11

Increase enforcement of the existing voluntary curfew at Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR).

Responsible Entity: Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority

BGPAA Response: BGPAA currently monitors all aircraft operations for compliance with the voluntary curfew. Operators who appear to violate the voluntary curfew are consistently contacted by airport staff and appropriate actions are taken to encourage compliance. It should be noted that the voluntary curfew is applicable to the scheduling of air carrier operations and is not applicable to general aviation operations. Subject to consistency with the Airport Noise and Capacity Act, as part of an updated noise abatement best practices guide for airport users, BGPAA will consider including language that encourages general aviation operators to be cognizant of the voluntary curfew applicable to the scheduled air carriers.

Recommendation 14

Maintain and update when and if necessary the Noise Exposure Map (NEM) and Noise Compatibility Program (NCP) at Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR) and Van Nuys Airport (VNY) in order to continue to provide noise mitigation to all potentially eligible property owners and continue to monitor the aircraft operations and associated noise levels throughout the San Fernando Valley communities. The NCPs will specifically consider preferential runway use programs in a coordinated approach at both airports to determine whether more northerly flow provides noise benefits. The NCP at BUR will also analyze Runway 33 arrivals to limit the use of the flight path some operators use to arrive over the Santa Monica Mountains.

Responsible Entities: Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority and Los Angeles World Airports

BGPAA Response: As previously noted, BGPAA intends to undertake a new Part 150 study once there has been sufficient operational and economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. That study will include updated noise exposure maps.

Recommendation 15

Create a Citizen's Advisory Committee at Hollywood Burbank Airport (BUR) to address community concerns throughout the San Fernando Valley.

Responsible Entity: Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority

BGPAA Response: BGPAA is currently evaluating issues associated with the creation of a Citizen's Advisory Committee. The issues being considered include size, membership selection, function, and duration. BGPAA anticipates that a final determination will be made by the end of the year and will provide an update at that time.

The Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority Commission resolves as follows:

WHEREAS, the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority ("Authority") owns and operates the Hollywood Burbank Airport ("Airport"); and

WHEREAS, the Authority's mission is to provide state-of-the-art regional airport facilities and related services which are efficient, safe, convenient, and user-friendly, while being a good neighbor; and

WHEREAS, the Authority strives to be a good neighbor to all surrounding communities; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has worked diligently with passenger airlines to obtain compliance with a voluntary curfew on scheduled takeoffs and arrivals between the hours of 10 p.m. to 6:59 a.m. local time; and

WHEREAS, the Authority spent nearly \$7,000,000 and nine years in an unsuccessful effort to obtain Federal Aviation Administration ("FAA") approval of a Part 161 Application seeking to convert the voluntary curfew into a mandatory restriction; and

WHEREAS, the Authority additionally has spent millions of dollars in noise mitigation and abatement activities; and

WHEREAS, documented changes in takeoff flight patterns have concentrated flights over neighborhoods south of the Ventura freeway; and

WHEREAS, in 2018 a consultant retained by the Authority studied these takeoff flight pattern changes and identified several possible contributing factors including the FAA's NextGen Transportation System, steadily rising summer temperatures since 2012, and an increased number of aircraft in Southern California's airspace; and

WHEREAS, federal law (49 U.S.C. § 40103) provides that the "United States Government has exclusive sovereignty of airspace of the United States" and requires the FAA to "prescribe air traffic regulations on the flight of aircraft."

NOW, THEREFORE, in an effort to improve the quality of life in neighborhoods south of the Ventura Freeway, the Authority Commission recommends as follows:

That the FAA implement alternative dispersal headings and optimize ascent for 1. flights departing the Airport in order to achieve an equitable distribution of impacts on affected communities.

That the FAA implement the maximum feasible time interval between flights 2. departing the Airport as conditions will allow.

RESOLUTION NO. 488

A RESOLUTION OF THE BURBANK-GLENDALE-PASADENA AIRPORT AUTHORITY COMMISSION ESTABLISHING A CITIZEN'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO PROVIDE RECOMMENDATIONS ON UPDATES TO THE NOISE EXPOSURE MAP AND NOISE COMPATIBILITY PROGRAM

The Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority Commission resolves as follows:

Section 1. Findings.

A. Residents in the southern San Fernando Valley have expressed increased concerns about noise from airplanes that use Bob Hope Airport (commonly known as Hollywood Burbank Airport) ("BUR") and Van Nuys Airport ("VNY").

B. The Authority is committed to working with the community and other stakeholders to help identify potential actions to reduce airplane noise without shifting noise to other noise-sensitive communities.

C. In August 2019, the Authority and Los Angeles World Airports jointly formed the Southern San Fernando Valley Airplane Noise Task Force ("Task Force") to help address community concerns regarding noise associated with BUR and VNY.

D. Among other recommendations, the Task Force encouraged the Authority to create a Citizen's Advisory Committee ("CAC") to address community concerns throughout the San Fernando Valley.

E. The Commission concurs with the Task Force's recommendation and believes that a CAC will provide a significant contribution to the Authority's update of its Noise Exposure Map and Noise Compatibility Program pursuant to Title 14, Part 150 of the Code of Federal Regulations ("Part 150").

<u>Section 2</u>. <u>Establishment</u>. The Authority shall have a CAC to be known as the "Hollywood Burbank Airport Citizen's Advisory Committee."

<u>Section 3</u>. <u>Functions</u>. The CAC shall be a purely advisory body and shall focus exclusively on the following matters: (i) gathering public input on airplane noise issues associated with BUR; and (ii) assisting in the update of the Authority's Noise Exposure Map and Noise Compatibility Program pursuant to Part 150. Other matters, including airport marketing, airline retention, and the replacement terminal project, are not within the CAC's jurisdiction. The CAC shall not have access to attorney-client privilege Authority documents without prior authorization from the Commission.

Section 4. Membership.

A. The CAC shall be a 12-member body comprised of three members from each of the Cities of Burbank, Glendale, Pasadena, and Los Angeles. CAC members shall be residents of the city that they are representing; provided, however, that the Los Angeles representatives shall be residents of Los Angeles City Council Districts 2, 4, and 6 (one each).

B. CAC members shall be appointed by the Commission by majority vote. The Authority shall ask the Burbank City Council, the Glendale City Council, and the Pasadena City Council to each recommend three constituents who are interested in serving on the CAC; and shall ask the Los Angeles City Council Members from Districts 2, 4, and 6 to each recommend one constituent who is interested in serving on the CAC. The Commission shall reasonably defer to the recommendations received, but the Commission may reject any recommendation and appoint an alternative person at its discretion. In the event the Commission rejects one or more recommendations, the Authority shall solicit applications from residents of the area(s) to be represented. Any person who is an elected official, a staff member of an elected official, or a candidate for elective office shall not be considered for appointment to the CAC.

C. The Commission shall proceed with the appointment of CAC members upon determining that the Authority has made a sufficient operational and economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

D. CAC members shall serve without compensation at the pleasure of the Commission and may be removed by majority vote of the Commission.

Section 5. Officers. The CAC shall elect a Chairperson from its membership.

<u>Section 6.</u> <u>Meetings</u>. Regular meetings of the CAC shall be held on a quarterly basis. CAC meetings shall be held in accordance with the Brown Act (Government Code Sections 54950 et seq.).

<u>Section 7.</u> <u>Duration</u>. The CAC shall become active upon appoint of its membership by the Commission. The CAC shall dissolve upon the Authority's submission of an updated Noise Exposure Map and Noise Compatibility Program to the FAA.

Section 8. Effective Date. This Resolution shall be effective upon adoption.

Dear Administrator Dickson:

I write to you on behalf of the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority ("Authority"), owner/operator of the Bob Hope Airport, commonly known as the Hollywood-Burbank Airport ("BUR"). The Authority previously has written to the Federal Aviation Administration ("FAA") a number of times concerning a southern drift in departure tracks from BUR, which had led to growing public controversy concerning the impacts of that drift on City of Los Angeles residents south of the Airport. In those letters, and in a resolution adopted by the Authority Commission on June 17, 2019, the Authority requested that flight tracks be returned to their historic patterns while the matter is further studied by the FAA.

You also will recall that the Authority and Los Angeles World Airports jointly formed the Southern San Fernando Valley Airplane Noise Task Force ("Task Force") in 2019 to help address community noise concerns regarding aircraft departures from BUR and from Van Nuys Airport. The Task Force worked into the pandemic and ultimately developed consensus recommendations (including optimizing up and out procedures) to minimize aircraft noise throughout the southern San Fernando Valley.¹ The Authority previously thanked the FAA for participating in an advisory capacity at the meetings of the Task Force and again extends its appreciation to the FAA.

¹ During the pandemic, flights at the Airport decreased significantly, both in terms of volume and load factor. The southern drift, however, continued.

The Authority is aware that the FAA has previously stated that flight procedures at BUR remain within the same historical flight paths that existed prior to the implementation of the Southern California Metroplex. The Authority is also aware that there is ongoing litigation between the City of Los Angeles and the FAA concerning departure flight tracks at BUR and a separate litigation involving arrival flight tracks at Los Angeles International Airport.

Notwithstanding the above, given that aircraft operations are now increasing across the country despite the ongoing Covid situation, the Authority renews its request that the FAA take action to return BUR departures to their historic flight tracks.

The Authority makes its request fully aware that under federal law the United States government has exclusive sovereignty over the airspace of the United States. Additionally, having unsuccessfully submitted a Part 161 application for a mandatory curfew at BUR, the Authority also is aware that the Airport Noise and Capacity Act of 1990 precludes airport proprietors from imposing noise or access restrictions without FAA approval.

Your consideration to this request is greatly appreciated.

AWARD OF PURCHASE ORDER AIRPORT OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT PORTABLE RADIO REPLACEMENT

Presented by Thomas Henderson Director, Operations

SUMMARY

At its meeting on July 19, 2021, the Operations and Development Committee ("Committee") voted unanimously (3–0) to recommend that the Commission approve the acquisition of replacement interoperable radio equipment from Motorola Solutions. The proposed acquisition replaces the Airport Operations Department's current seventeen handheld Motorola portable radios, which have reached the end of their useful life, with the Motorola APX 8000 series radios and ancillary accessories at a total cost of \$122,699.95.

BACKGROUND

The Airport Operations Department personnel currently share seventeen interoperable portable radios which have reached the end of their useful life and will no longer be supported by Motorola for repairs or service. The purchase of the Motorola APX 8000 model radio maintains uniformity with the recently acquired replacement interoperable radios purchased for both Airport Police and Airport Fire Departments.

Interoperable communication equipment for the Airport Operations Department is essential to maintain access to communications with Airport Police, Airport Fire, the Airport Communications Center as well as Verdugo Fire Communications Center in the course of the department's daily duties. The APX 8000 is a rugged and reliable model that meets interoperability requirements of the local area Interagency Communications Interoperability System and provides advanced features such as adaptive audio processing and advanced security including encryption capabilities. The Authority also contracts with the City of Burbank for radio programing services and the proposed acquisition of Motorola equipment ensures that all Airport Departments continue to maintain programming consistency with Burbank's public safety departments.

Allocation of the proposed radios is:

- Six units for Communications Center, staged at both primary and alternate locations
- Eleven units for field Operations personnel

By participating in the Territory Los Angeles Volume Pricing Program, the cost of these radios are reduced by 32% per radio with a 20% discount applied to accessories. Details on the radios and accessories are listed on the attached proposal from Motorola Solutions, the exclusive authorized provider of Motorola radios.

FUNDING

Appropriations in the amount of \$125,000 are included in the recently adopted FY 2022 budget for the acquisition of these replacement interoperable portable radios.

RECOMMENDATION

At its meeting on July 19, 2021, the Committee voted unanimously (3–0) to recommend that the Commission approve to authorize the issuance of a purchase order in the amount of \$122,699.95 for the proposed replacement Motorola APX 8000 series radios.

AWARD OF LICENSE AGREEMENT COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES

Presented by Sumire Spurlock Manager, Safety Management System

SUMMARY

Subject to the recommendation of the Operations and Development Committee ("Committee") at its meeting immediately preceding the Commission meeting, Staff seeks approval from the Commission to award a License Agreement ("Agreement"), copy attached, to the County of Los Angeles ("County") for the purpose of conducting a temporary free COVID-19 vaccination clinic within the Airport passenger terminal building ("Terminal") commencing on August 16, 2021 through August 15, 2022.

COVID-19 continues to exist as does the need to provide the general public access to free COVID-19 vaccinations.

BACKGROUND

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, Staff has been working with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health ("LACDPH") on matters related to ensuring the safety and well-being of airport customers, staff, tenants, vendors and service providers. These efforts and coordination with LACDPH continue to this day. As the mass vaccination sites within the City of Los Angeles have closed, LACDPH contacted Staff about the possibility of conducting a temporary vaccination clinic within the Terminal through the County's contracted provider, MedEx Pharmacies.

Staff met with LACDPH representatives, and a proposed location was identified in the corridor leading toward the Terminal A Security Checkpoint, depicted in Exhibit A of the proposed Agreement. While visible, this location is not intrusive to the flow of passenger traffic. The term of the proposed Agreement is through August 15, 2022, and is can be cancelled upon thirty days' notice by either party.

REVENUE IMPACT

The proposed Agreement is a no-cost license that provides temporary access for the purpose of conducting a free COVID-19 vaccination clinic within the Terminal.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff seeks the Committee's recommendation to the Commission that it approve the proposed Agreement with the County to allow access to the Terminal for a free COVID-19 vaccination clinic and authorize the President to execute the same.

LICENSE AGREEMENT

THIS LICENSE AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is dated August 16, 2021 for reference purposes, and is executed by the BURBANK-GLENDALE-PASADENA AIRPORT AUTHORITY, a California joint powers agency ("Licensor"), and the COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, a California political subdivision ("Licensee").

RECITALS

A. Licensor is the owner and operator of the Bob Hope Airport ("Airport") (commonly known as "Hollywood Burbank Airport").

B. Licensee has requested the right to temporarily use a portion of the passenger terminal building depicted on Exhibit A ("Licensed Premises") for a COVID-19 vaccination clinic ("Clinic")

C. Licensor has agreed to give to Licensee, and Licensee has agreed to accept from Licensor, a temporary and limited contractual license to enter upon the Airport to conduct the Clinic in accordance with and subject to this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the foregoing recitals, the mutual terms, covenants and agreements contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, Licensor and Licensee agree as follows:

1. <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall commence on August 16, 2021 ("License Commencement Date") and shall expire on August 15, 2022 unless earlier terminated. Either party may terminate this Agreement without cause upon 30 days' prior written notice. Licensee hereby waives any and all rights to relocation benefits under applicable law upon the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.

2. <u>Use of Licensed Premises</u>.

2.1 <u>Licensee</u> may use the Licensed Premises during the term of this Agreement for the Clinic only, and for no other use or purpose. Licensee may operate the Clinic through a contract with MedEx Pharmacies. In connection therewith, Licensee shall comply with the FAA Grant Assurances described in the attached <u>Exhibit C</u> to the extent applicable, and with all applicable laws.

2.2 Licensor shall have the right to enter and inspect the Licensed Premises at any time. It is understood and agreed that nothing herein contained shall be construed to grant or authorize the granting of any exclusive right within the meaning of Section 308 (a) of the Federal Aviation Act of 1958 (49 U.S.C. 1349(a)).

2.3 Licensee shall not make use of the Airport in any manner that might interfere with the landing and taking off of aircraft from the Airport, or that might otherwise constitute a hazard. In the event this covenant is breached, in addition to all other rights and remedies of Licensor, Licensor may cause the abatement of such interference at Licensee's expense.

2.4 Licensee shall prevent persons under Licensee's supervision from gaining unauthorized access to restricted flight and aircraft operational areas of the Airport.

3. <u>No Improvements; Hazardous Substances</u>. Licensee shall not construct any improvements on the Licensed Premises. Licensee shall not store or release any hazardous materials or substances on the Licensed Premises or the Airport.

4. <u>Trash Removal</u>. Licensee shall remove and properly dispose of all trash.

5. <u>Removal of Personal Property</u>. No later than the expiration date or any earlier termination date of this Agreement, Licensee shall remove its personal property from the Licensed Premises (and the Airport) and shall restore the Licensed Premises to its condition of the date of execution of this Agreement. If Licensee does not do so, then Licensor may do so, and may dispose of or retain such property without obligation or liability to Licensee.

6. <u>Damage</u>; Indemnity. Licensee agrees that: (i) all activities by or on behalf of Licensee, or Licensee's officers, members, employees, agents, customers, guests or contractors (collectively, "Licensee's Designees") shall not damage the Licensed Premises or the Airport in any manner whatsoever (normal wear and tear excepted); and (ii) in the event the Airport is damaged, altered, or disturbed in any manner in connection with the Clinic, Licensee shall return the Licensed Premises and the Airport to the condition existing prior to the damage, alteration, or disturbance. To the extent allowable by law, Licensee and Licensor shall mutually indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the other party and the other party's officers, employees, agents, contractors and volunteers, against any and all liability, loss, damage, expense, costs (including reasonable attorneys' fees) or claims for injury or property damages to the extent arising out of or in connection with Licensee's or Licensor's acts and/or omissions arising from or related to the Agreement, including Licensee's or Licensor's breach of the Agreement. This provision shall survive the expiration or termination of the Agreement.

7. Public Readiness and Emergency Preparedness Act of 2005 (PREP Act). The PREP Act authorizes the Secretary of the US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to issue a PREP Act declaration that provides immunity from liability (except for willful misconduct) for claims of loss caused, arising out of, relating to, or resulting from administration or use of medical countermeasures to disease, threats and conditions determined by the Secretary to constitute a present, or credible risk of a future public health emergency to entities and individuals involved in the development, manufacture, testing, distribution, administration, and use of such medical countermeasures. A PREP Act declaration is specifically for the purpose of providing immunity from liability, and is different from, and not dependent on, other emergency declarations. Licensee and Licensor agree that they and their employees, subcontractors, and all volunteers shall be bound by and shall abide by all applicable federal and State statutes or regulations pertaining to the confidentiality of client records and information. The parties shall not use or disclose any information about a recipient of the services provided under this Agreement for any purpose not connected with the parties' Agreement responsibilities, except with the written consent of such recipient, recipient's attorney, or recipient's parent or guardian, or as required by law.

8. <u>Insurance</u>. At all times during the term of this Agreement and at its sole cost and expense, Licensee shall maintain or cause to be maintained in effect the insurance coverage specified in the July 15, 2021 proof of insurance set forth in the attached <u>Exhibit B</u>.

9. <u>Contractual in Nature; No Recording</u>. Licensor does not hereby convey to Licensee any right, title, or interest in or to the Airport, but merely grants the specific and limited contractual rights and privileges set forth in this Agreement. In no event shall this Agreement or any memorandum hereof be recorded.

10. <u>Notices</u>. Any notice, demand, request, consent, approval, or communication hereunder shall be in writing; shall be delivered either by (i) e-mail at the addresses set forth below (deemed delivered on the date of delivery provided the e-mail is not rejected as shown by the sender's e-mail system), (ii) certified mail (deemed delivered on date of delivery or attempted delivery on the return receipt) or (iii) reputable overnight delivery service (deemed delivered one business day after being given to the service for overnight delivery); and shall be addressed as set forth below.

11. <u>Assignment</u>. This Agreement may not be assigned by Licensee, in whole or in part.

12. <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be construed, enforced, and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

13. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, and all of such counterparts together shall constitute one and the same instrument. Furthermore, executed counterparts of this Agreement may be delivered by e-mails of pdf documents, and such electronic transmissions shall be valid and binding for all purposes when transmitted to and actually received by the other party.

14. <u>Time</u>. Time is of the essence of this Agreement and each and all of its provisions in which performance is a factor.

15. <u>Prior Agreements</u>. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the Clinic.

16. <u>Partial Invalidity</u>. Any provision of this Agreement which shall prove to be invalid, void, or illegal shall in no way affect, impair or invalidate any other provision hereof and such other provision shall remain in full force and effect.

17. <u>Attorneys' Fees</u>. If any party brings an action in connection with this Agreement, the prevailing party in any such action, as determined by the trier of fact, shall be entitled to recover its costs and reasonable outside attorneys' fees.

18. <u>Condition of Property</u>. Licensee represents that it has inspected the Licensed Premises and hereby accepts the Licensed Premises in its current "AS IS" condition, without representation or warranty, express or implied.

19. <u>Exhibits</u>. <u>Exhibits</u> A through C are incorporated into this Agreement by reference. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of Exhibits A or B, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of Exhibit C, the provisions of Exhibit C shall prevail.

20. <u>Incorporation of Mandatory Language</u>. Each and every provision required by law to be inserted in this Agreement shall be deemed to be inserted and this Agreement shall be read and enforced as though such provision were included. If through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted, or is not correctly inserted, then upon request of either party this Agreement shall promptly be amended to make such insertion or correction.

21. <u>Compensation</u>. No reimbursement or compensation will be made by Licensee to the Licensor for the use of the Licensed Premises described herein.

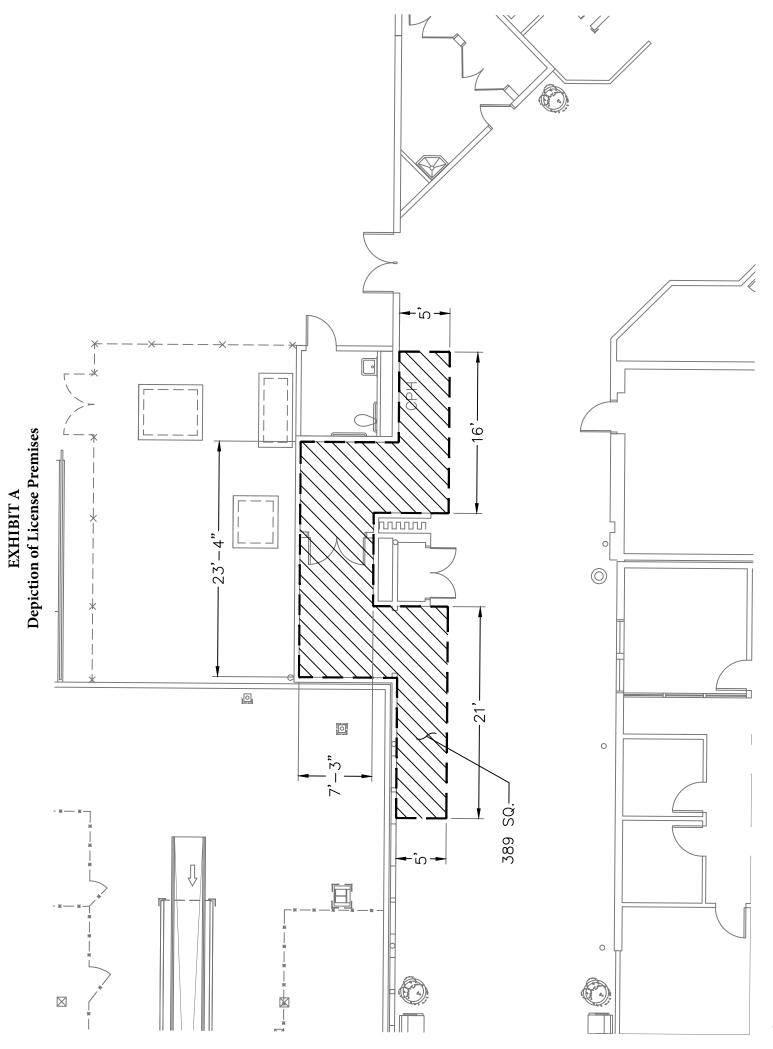

EXHIBIT C FAA Grant Assurances

A. Licensee, for itself, its representatives, successors in interest, and permitted assigns, as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree as a covenant running with the Licensed Premises that in the event facilities are constructed, maintained, or otherwise operated on the Licensed Premises for a purpose for which a Department of Transportation program or activity is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits, Licensee shall maintain and operate such facilities and services in compliance with all other requirements imposed pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Nondiscrimination in Federally-Assisted Programs of the Department of Transportation-Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and as such regulations may be amended.

B. Licensee for itself and its representatives, successors and any permitted assigns as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree that:

1. No person on the ground of race, color, or national origin shall be excluded from participation, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the use of the Airport;

2. In the construction of any improvements on, over or under the Licensed Premises, if allowed, and the furnishings of services thereon, no person on the ground of race, color, or national origin shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination; and

3. Licensee shall use the Licensed Premises in compliance with all other requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, part 21, Nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation-Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and as such Regulations may be amended.

C. In the event of breach of any of the above nondiscrimination covenants, Licensor shall have the right to terminate this Agreement and to re-enter and to repossess the Licensed Premises, and hold the Licensed Premises as if this Agreement had never been made.

D. Licensee shall furnish its accommodations and/or services on a fair, equal and not unjustly discriminatory basis to all users thereof and it shall charge fair, reasonable and not unjustly discriminatory prices for each unit or service; provided, that Licensee may make reasonable and nondiscriminatory discounts, rebates or other similar type of price reductions to volume purchasers.

E. Noncompliance with paragraph D, above shall constitute a material breach hereof and in the event of such noncompliance Licensor shall have the right to terminate this Agreement

STAFF REPORT PRESENTED TO THE BURBANK-GLENDALE-PASADENA AIRPORT AUTHORITY AUGUST 16, 2021

ALLIED UNIVERSAL CONTRACT AMENDMENT

Presented by Ray Hunting Airport Security Manager

<u>SUMMARY</u>

Subject to the recommendation of the Operations and Development Committee ("Committee") at its meeting immediately preceding the Commission meeting, Staff seeks approval from the Commission for a proposed Amendment No. 3 ("Third Amendment") to the Professional Services Agreement ("PSA") with Universal Protection Service LP, dba Allied Universal ("Allied Universal"), to increase the appropriations for airport security and traffic controls services. In October 2020, the Commission approved a one-year extension of this PSA, in the amount of \$974,413, based on the projected reduced traffic volume due to the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the contract is set to expire on October 31, 2021. However with the rapid return of leisure travel, vehicular and passenger traffic has increased significantly. In order to maintain consistent flow of traffic and ensure pedestrian safety on the Airport roads, Staff is recommending that the current appropriation be increased by a not-to-exceed amount of \$125,000 to accommodate additional staffing, which would result in a total contract amount of \$1,099,413 for the extension period ending October 31, 2021.

BACKGROUND

The airport security and traffic control services that are being provided are:

- (i) Perimeter Security: Transportation Security Administration security directives require the Authority to provide for positive control and identification of each person gaining access to the Secured Area of the Airport. Part of this positive control requires staffing at checkpoints on the airfield.
- (ii) Traffic Control: Due to the configuration and congestion of the airport loop road from increased vehicle traffic, traffic control from the crosswalk located next to the short-term parking structure to past Terminal B is necessary in order to ensure pedestrian safety and vehicular flow, as well as manage vehicle activity along the terminal curb front.

BUDGET IMPACT

As discussed during the contract extension presentation last October, Staff advised the Committee that if a significant increase in passenger and traffic activity occurred requiring additional staffing hours, Staff would return to seek additional authorization. Staff is now seeking such additional authorization.

RECOMMENDATION

Subject to the recommendation of the Committee at its meeting immediately preceding the Commission meeting, Staff seeks approval from the Commission for a proposed Third

Amendment to the PSA with Allied Universal to increase staffing and hours for traffic control services for the remainder of the contract with a not-to-exceed amount of \$125,000 of the total contract amount.

AMENDMENT NO. 3 TO PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

(Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority / Allied Universal)

THIS AMENDMENT NO. 3 ("Third Amendment") to the October 13, 2017 Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") executed by the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority ("Authority"), a California joint powers agency, and Universal Protection Service, LP d.b.a. Allied Universal ("Consultant"), a California Limited Partnership, is dated August 16, 2021 for reference purposes.

RECITALS

A. The parties executed the Agreement to provide for the Authority's retention of Consultant as an independent contractor to provide the following professional services: airport security and traffic control services.

B. The parties have executed the following amendments (collectively, "Prior Amendments") to the Agreement:

1. An April 15, 2019 Amendment No. 1 to: (i) expand the scope of services; and (ii) increase the contract price.

2. An October 19, 2020 Amendment No. 2 to: (i) provide for a one-year extension; and (ii) set the staffing level and compensation limit for the extension period.

C. The parties desire to amend the Agreement to further increase the staff level and compensation limit for the remainder of the extension period.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. Amendment of Section 1. Paragraph (F) ("Contract Limit") of Section 1 ("Definitions") of the Agreement is amended to read as follows:

"(F) 'Contract Limit': Four Million Eight Hundred Thirty-Six Thousand Three Hundred Forty-Nine Dollars and Forty-Four Cents (\$4,836,349.44)."

2. Amendment of Section 4. Paragraph (A) of Section 4 ("Compensation") of the Agreement is amended to read as follows:

"(A) The Authority shall compensate Consultant for performance of the Services, and Consultant agrees to accept as full satisfaction for such work, payment according to the Rate Sheet for Years 1-3 and according to the Supplemental Rate Sheet for the Extension Period. In no event shall the compensation payable to Consultant under this Agreement exceed the Contract Limit. In no event shall the compensation payable to Consultant for the Services set forth in Exhibit "A-1" exceed Two Hundred Twenty Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars and Zero Cents (\$220,500.00) between May 1, 2019 through October 31, 2020. In no event shall the compensation payable to Consultant for the Services during the Extension Period exceed One Million Ninety-Nine

Thousand Four Hundred Thirteen Dollars and Zero Cents (\$1,099,413.00)."

3. Replacement of Exhibit E. Effective August 17, 2021, references in the Agreement to Exhibit E shall be deemed to refer to the attached Replacement Supplemental Rate Sheet.

4. **Preservation of Agreement.** Except as expressly modified by this Third Amendment, all of the provisions of the Agreement (as amended by the Prior Amendments) shall remain unaltered and in full force and effect. In the event of a conflict between the provisions of this Third Amendment and the provisions of the Agreement (as amended by the Prior Amendments), the provisions of this Third Amendment shall control.

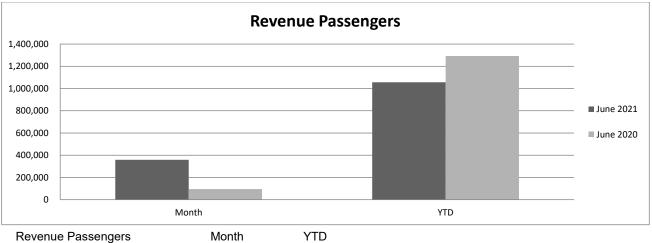
