EXECUTIVE SUMMARY MONTH AND TWO MONTHS ENDED AUGUST 31, 2025

Introduction:

The Treasurer's Report includes the Authority's month-end summary of investments and investment activity, and the Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements ("Schedule"), which represents the cash basis activity for the month and fiscal-year-to-date ("FYTD") compared to the allocation of the annual adopted budget. As this Schedule is on a cash basis, cash timing differences may contribute to budget variances. The purpose of this report is to provide monthly updates on how the Authority's cash transaction activities are tracking to the adopted budget, and to provide insight to the Authority's change in liquidity each month. In summary, FYTD August 2025 financial activity is tracking favorably to the budget.

Below are the most significant highlights of activities for the month and FYTD ended August 31, 2025.

Passenger Activity:

Passenger activity decreased by 9.30% FYTD August when compared to the same period last year, primarily due to a reduction in air service. When compared to the budget assumption FYTD August, passenger activity was unfavorable by 3.77%. However, overall financial performance FYTD August remains positive to budget.

Operating Activities:

- 1) Operating revenues exceed the FYTD August budget by \$1,664,414 on the cash basis and \$1,719,447 on the full accrual basis.
- 2) Operating expenses are within budgeted parameters.
- 3) Net increase in cash from operating activities FYTD August is \$3,583,205 and positive to budget by \$3,107,702.

Non-RPT Facility Improvement Program:

- 1) Payments related to the Runway/Taxiway Shoulder Rehabilitation and the Southeast Quadrant Reconfiguration Design projects comprised the majority of August's non-RPT capital cash disbursements.
- 2) There were no federal grant or PFC drawdowns in the month of August for non-RPT projects.

RPT Activities:

- 1) Payments of \$50,653,266 and \$8,762,570 were made in August to HPTJV, including retention payment to respective escrow account, and City of Burbank Water and Power for Aid-in-Construction deposits related to the community substation, respectively.
- 2) 2024 Bond draws for eligible RPT expenditures of \$47,449,545 were received in August. PFC drawdowns totaling \$1,040,810 for eligible RPT expenditures were also received in August.
- 3) The majority of FYTD August expenditures are related to Holder Pankow JV, Jacobs Project Management and the City of Burbank Water and Power Aid-In-Construction payments for the community substation, totaling \$106,689,309, or 99% of the total FYTD August RPT expenditures.
- 4) On a cash basis, expenditures are below budget due to the timing of when invoices are received and paid. Overall, the RPT project is on budget and on schedule.

Summary:

August 2025 activities resulted in a net cash decrease of \$7,895,154 for the month and \$19,787,582 FYTD August primarily due to the timing of cash disbursements and reimbursements related to the RPT project. However, overall FYTD August cash flows remain positive to budget by \$6,379,628



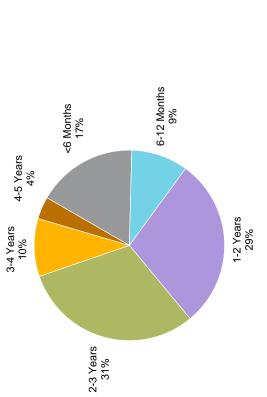

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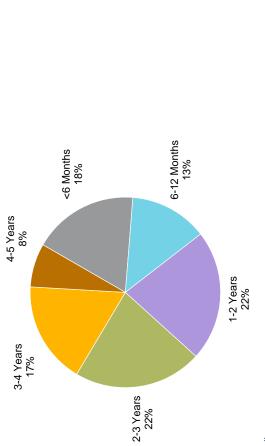


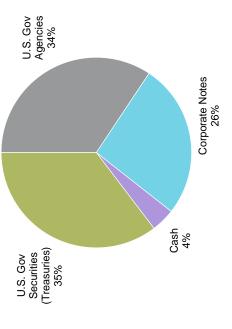

General Comments

The Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements ("Schedule") represents the cash basis activity for the month and fiscal year-to-date ("FYTD") compared to the allocation of the annual adopted budget.

The Schedule consists of two sections: Operating Activity and Facility Improvement Transactions. Receipts are shown as positive amounts and disbursements as negative amounts. Favorable budget variances are shown as positive amounts and unfavorable variances as negative amounts. Because this Schedule is on a cash basis, cash timing differences may contribute to budget variances.

The Operating Activity receipts include charges for services (parking, landing fees and concessions), tenant rents, fuel flowage fees, other revenues and investment receipts. The Operating Activity disbursements include costs of services, materials, contracts, and personnel.

Facility Improvement Transactions represent the activity for the Authority's capital program, which consists of Other Facility Improvement Program Projects and the Noise Mitigation Program.

FY 2026 Replacement Passenger Terminal ("RPT") Project expenditures are primarily funded through federal grants, FAA-approved use of Passenger Facility Charge ("PFC") fees, and proceeds from General Airport Revenue Bonds ("GARBs").

The FY 2026 Non-RPT Capital Program expenditures are primarily funded through the following sources:

- FAA-approved PFC program receipts/reserves;
- Grants; and
- Operating Revenues

The notes below provide additional information regarding the performance results detailed in the "Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements."

A Supplemental Schedule of Cash Receipts and Disbursements reflecting the activities related to the 2012 Bond debt service for the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center / Consolidated Rental Car Facility is also presented.

The adopted FY 2026 budget was premised on an activity level assumption of 6,200,000 annual passengers, reflecting a 5.75% reduction from actual FY 2025 levels. The budgeted passenger activity is allocated monthly based on historical activity and seasonality trends. Passenger count decreased by 9.30% and 3.77% FYTD August when compared to the same period in FY 2025 and the budget, respectively. Overall financial performance in August remains positive to the budget.

NOTE (1) - Cash Receipts from Operations

Cash receipts from operations exceed the budget FYTD August. On an accrual basis, operating revenues exceed the budget FYTD August by \$1,719,447. See notes 2 through 8 for additional information regarding operating receipts.

NOTE (2) - Landing/Fuel Fees

Landing Fees are based on landed weight of the aircraft. Fuel fees are charged at a rate of \$0.05 a gallon to non-signatory air carriers for fuel loaded at BUR. On an accrual basis, Landing Fees combined with Fuel Flowage Fees exceed the budget by \$153,995 FYTD August.

NOTE (3) - Parking Fees

Parking fee revenues performed above the budget forecast FYTD August. Accrual basis Parking Fees exceed the budget by \$316,052 FYTD August.

NOTE (4) - Rental/Concession Receipts - Terminal Building

Terminal Building rental/concession receipts exceeded the budget FYTD August partially due to the timing of receipts. Accrual basis Terminal Building rents/concessions exceed the budget by \$451,395 FYTD August.

NOTE (5) - Rental Receipts - Other Buildings

Other Buildings rental receipts exceed the budget FYTD August partially due to the timing of receipts. Accrual basis Other Building rents are \$216,857 above budget expectations FYTD August due to CPI adjustments.

NOTE (6) - Ground Transportation

This category consists of off-airport access fees and TNC activity. Accrual basis Ground Transportation receipts exceeded budget by \$35,585 FYTD August.

NOTE (7) - Other Receipts

Other Receipts consist primarily of ground handling and airfield access fees. Accrual basis Other Receipts are \$63,860 ahead of budget FYTD August.

NOTE (8) - Investment Receipts - Treasurer

This line item represents cash received from the investment of funds. These receipts fluctuate in response to interest rate and portfolio balance changes, the timing of coupon payments, and individual investment maturities. Accrual basis investment income exceeds the budget by \$481,703 FYTD August.

NOTE (9) - Cash Disbursements from Operations

Overall operating disbursements on a cash basis and accrual basis are favorably under the budget FYTD August. See additional information on operating disbursement in notes 10 through 16.

NOTE (10) - Administrative Supplies & Costs

This line item includes office supplies, printing, postage and delivery, office equipment service and lease, recruiting, membership, uniform, Commission meeting, conference and training costs.

NOTE (11) - Operating Supplies & Maintenance

This line item includes utilities, fuel, general repairs and maintenance, landscaping, supplies and telephone costs.

NOTE (12) - Contractual Operating Costs

This line item includes various contractual operating costs such as ARFF services, janitorial services, systems and vehicle repair, parking operations and the TBI Airport Management contract costs.

NOTE (13) - Contractual Professional Services

This line item includes various professional services such as legal, auditing, noise, financial and insurance.

NOTE (14) - Wages and Benefits

Wages and Benefits consist of payroll and fringe benefit costs for the Airport Police officers, and include the impact of the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding effective February 2023.

NOTE (15) - Other Operating Costs

This line item primarily includes public relations/advertising, air service retention, and license/permit fees.

NOTE (16) - Parking Tax

The 12% City of Burbank parking tax is paid quarterly for the prior three-month period. The next remittance, covering the months of July, August, and September 2025, is due October 2025.

NOTE (17) - Noise Mitigation Program

FAA Grants and a PFC match are budgeted to fund the multi-year Part 150 Update project. This project commenced Q3 FY 2024 and is ongoing.

NOTE (18) - Other Facility Improvement Program Projects

Other Facility Improvement Program Project costs on a cash basis are on track with the budget FYTD August.

NOTE (19) - FAA Grants - Facility Improvement Program Projects

FAA Grants and a PFC match are budgeted to fund the design services for the Taxiway A and C extensions project.

NOTE (20) - Passenger Facility Charge Receipts/Reserves

A number of capital projects are budgeted to be funded or partially funded by Passenger Facility Charges, including the construction of the Runway and Taxiway Shoulder Rehabilitation, continued design efforts for the southeast quadrant of the Airport, acquisition of an Airport Pavement Management System, update to the Airport Layout Plan, and the Part 150 Update project.

NOTE (21) - Customer Facility Charge Reserves

The Regional Intermodal Transportation Center ("RITC") Art in Public Places capital project was funded by Customer Facility Charge Reserves and completed December 2024.

NOTE (22) - Replacement Passenger Terminal Project

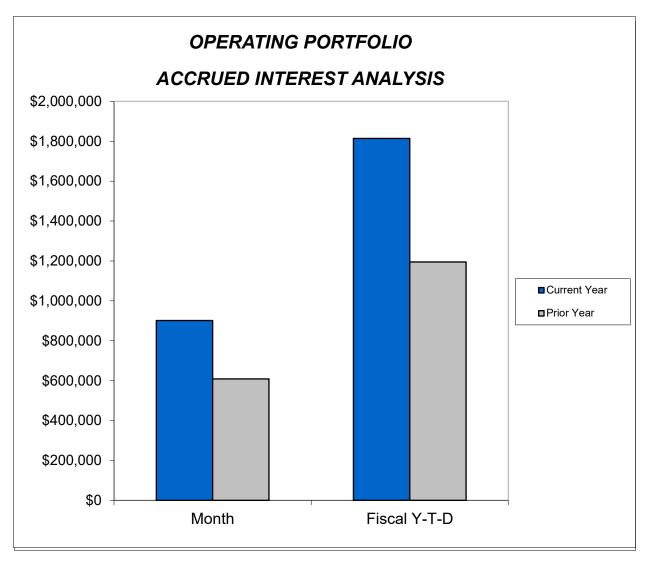
The Authority programmed appropriations in the amount of \$590,756,795 for development of the multi-year RPT program. RPT costs on a cash basis are below budget expectations FYTD August by \$3,552,947 primarily due to the timing of payments. The majority of cash expenditures FYTD August are related to Holder, Pankow, TEC JV (\$94,483,214), inclusive of retention payments to the escrow bank, Jacobs Project Management (\$3,218,525), and the City of Burbank Water and Power Aid-in-Construction Deposits (\$8,987,570).

NOTE (23) - Replacement Passenger Terminal Project Funding Sources

Includes funding sources specifically approved for reimbursement of certain eligible RPT expenses, which include FAA grant awards, FAA approved Passenger Facility Charge fees and Revenue Bond reimbursements.

AWARD OF PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT PRIVATE WIRELESS NETWORK CONSULTING

<u>SUMMARY</u>

At its meeting on November 17, 2025, the Operations and Development Committee ("Committee") voted (3–0) to recommend that the Commission award a proposed Professional Services Agreement ("PSA"), copy attached, in the amount of \$339,739 for Private Wireless Network ("PWN") Consulting Services to Barich, Inc. ("Barich").

The proposed PSA provides consulting services for the preparation of a Request for Proposals ("RFP") to design, build, and install a PWN at locations within the Airport that do not have CAT-6 or fiber network connectivity to support the Authority's Digital Video Surveillance System ("DVSS") and local area network.

BACKGROUND

In response to the need for network connectivity in locations where it is not economically feasible to install either CAT-6 or fiber cabling, Staff issued an RFP for PWN consulting services on July 28, 2025, through the PlanetBids website for the development of alternate solutions. The responding firms listed in alphabetical order are:

Airport Gurus Corp.
Barich, Inc. and Imagine Wireless
Future Technologies Venture, LLC and Viventum Incorporated
Lufthansa Industry Solutions

EVALUATION PROCESS

The evaluation of each submission consisted of the following criteria:

SC-1: Firm Experience, Background, and Past Performance

SC-2: Qualifications of Proposed Project Team

SC-3: Technical Approach & Appropriate Credentials

SC-4: Proposed Pricing (Reviewed and scored by Procurement)

A review panel of three staff members and one outside reviewer from Ontario International Airport independently reviewed and scored the proposals based on the criteria SC-1 through SC-3, defined above. The Procurement Department completed the SC-4 criteria for final determination using an equally weighted average point allocation process for each criteria listed above, out of 100 points. The results are as follows:

After a thorough review of all the information received from the four submittals, Barich was ranked as the highest respondent.

Details of the scope of work Barich is to provide under the proposed PSA are:

- Task 1: Assessment and Scope Document Preparation
- Task 2: Evaluation of Provider(s) and Contract Advisement
- Task 3: Project Oversight During Implementation
- Term: 3 years

FUNDING

Approximately \$100,000 in expenditures for these services are anticipated to be incurred in FY 2026 which can be accommodated within the adopted budget appropriations. As this is a multi-year effort, appropriations for the continuation of services will be programmed in future budget requests. Based on this multi-year effort, a future capital project will be presented for consideration.

RECOMMENDATION

At its meeting on November 17, 2025, the Committee voted (3–0) to recommend that the Commission award a PSA for PWN consulting services to Barich and authorize the President to execute the same.

STAFF REPORT PRESENTED TO THE BURBANK-GLENDALE-PASADENA AIRPORT AUTHORITY DECEMBER 15, 2025

ADDITIONAL PUBLIC ARTWORK OPPORTUNITY REPLACEMENT PASSENGER TERMINAL

<u>SUMMARY</u>

At the direction of the Commission at its meeting of December 16, 2024, Staff returned to the Commission with five procurement and lightbox connector artwork program scenarios. At its meeting of March 17, 2025, the Commission directed Staff to pursue an Additional Artwork Opportunity program under Scenario E described in the staff report of March 17, 2025, copy attached. This program will showcase three artists per year on a 4-month rotation among the connectors located in the Replacement Passenger Terminal ("RPT") over a six-year period.

BACKGROUND

Staff were directed to outreach to local area artists for this additional artwork opportunity. Utilizing a Request for Qualifications ("RFQ"), or "Call to Artists," process, an extensive and targeted outreach was conducted in order to inform as many local artists as possible of this opportunity. Additionally, the communities of Burbank, Glendale, and Pasadena were engaged for outreach purposes.

The RFQ was issued on May 23, 2025, and was advertised through outreach to over 85 local arts organizations, neighborhood networks, and arts job boards. To help facilitate the artist application process and for ease of evaluating a large number of submittals, an online portfolio portal was provided to supplement the Authority's standard procurement procedure via PlanetBids. A total of 168 artists responded to the RFQ.

To facilitate the review process, a three-member Art Advisory Group was appointed by the Executive Director based on Susan F. Gray & Co.'s recommendations. These members were vetted through research and their experience in public art to provide recommendations on the artist selections. For curatorial continuity with the work selected for the RPT to satisfy the City of Burbank's Art in Public Places requirement, this Art Advisory Group included one member from the Public Art Advisory Panel. Staff also participated in the artist recommendation process to ensure the art content meets the Commission's direction.

Artist qualifications were evaluated based on artistic merit, originality, and appropriateness of their submitted portfolio of past work. The review did not require artists to provide evidence of previous public art experience. The top-ranking respondents were shortlisted to develop site-specific artwork proposals for the RPT, which were evaluated for artistic merit, originality, and conceptual alignment with the project site and the Authority's vision.

Of the 168 respondents, 18 artists were selected to continue the process. From this shortlist, the Art Advisory Group recommends nine artists to the Commission to enter into license agreements with the Authority to showcase their work in the RPT. The artists being recommended to display art on a rotating basis in each of the connectors over a period of three years are: Bea Lamar, Brent Noll, Lindsay Carron, Matthew Brandt, Michele Asselin, Nicole Pete, Seda Saar, Simonette Jackson, and Trinh Mai.

As the project is implemented, the program will outreach to businesses within Burbank, Glendale and Pasadena, that are able to supply photography, scanning, printing, and installation services for this program. Furthermore, the project team is actively working on how community engagement can continue through treasure hunts that explore artwork content, and other fun learning exercises targeted towards children and families.

After the first three years of display is completed and the original bank of artwork has been exhausted, the Commission will have the ability to procure a new set of artworks for the RPT for local artists to participate in.

FUNDING

As approved by the Commission at its meeting on March 17, 2025, the estimated cost of this program is \$595,684 for the six-year period. Of this amount, \$127,565 is for the initial procurement and installation which is included in the RPT budget. The remaining \$468,119 is for the multi-year O&M costs over the six-year period.

Initial expenditures for the remainder of FY 2026 are estimated at \$62,995, which will be funded through the RPT budget. Future appropriations to fund the program will be made in subsequent budget year requests.

RECOMMENDATION

At its meeting on December 3, 2025, the Executive Committee voted (2–0, 1 absent) to recommend to the Commission that license agreements be awarded to the nine artists identified by the Art Advisory Group for this additional artwork program, and that Staff and the project team be instructed to work with the selected artists to meet the RPT project schedule.

ADDITIONAL PUBLIC ARTWORK OPPORTUNITY ARTIST OUTREACH AND SELECTION PROGRAM REPLACEMENT PASSENGER TERMINAL

Presented by Susan Gray Susan F. Gray & Co.

SUMMARY

At its meeting on July 15, 2024, the Commission approved design modifications and infrastructure to provide for additional public artwork opportunities in the three modular connectors of the Replacement Passenger Terminal ("RPT"). The Design-Builder has begun this work.

Based on feedback provided by the Commission in the meeting on December 16, 2024, Staff is returning with more information for consideration, including licensing additional artists' work for display and rotating artwork more frequently. Staff also has revisited the Art Advisory Group stipends. Due to the timeline of the RPT Project, the project team recommends that the procurement process begin as soon as possible to meet the project schedule. The scenarios below and the staff recommendation were presented to the Executive Committee ("Committee") at their meeting on March 5, 2025. The Committee did not make a recommendation on this item, but instead directed that this item be submitted to the Commission with Staff's recommendation for further discussion.

BACKGROUND

At the direction of the Commission, Staff, the Program Manager and the Design-Builder worked to identify locations within the RPT which would provide additional public artwork opportunities. Staff and the Program Manager were further directed to develop a process for qualification, proposal, and selection for this additional public artwork. These opportunities would specifically not require any candidate to have past public artwork experience; selection would be focused primarily on artistic merit rather than on experience or education.

Based on the RPT project schedule, it was determined that presenting the creation of this additional public artwork opportunity to the Committee and the Commission in two steps would be most efficient. The first step was obtaining approval of the necessary design modifications and infrastructure. The second step is obtaining approval of an artist outreach and selection program.

It is proposed that the artists be selected through a Request for Qualifications ("RFQ"), or "Call to Artists," process. Extensive and targeted outreach will be conducted so local artists will be made aware of the opportunity, and the communities of Burbank, Glendale, and Pasadena will be engaged for outreach purposes. A new three-member peer Art Advisory Group will be appointed by the Executive Director based on Susan F. Gray's recommendations, which have been informed by research and experience in the industry to provide input on artist selection. For curatorial continuity, the Art Advisory Group will include one member of the Public Art

A member of Staff will participate to ensure the selected content is aligned with the Authority's vision. Staff maintains the recommendation of offering a modest stipend to each of the Art Advisory Group members for their time and effort in assisting with the evaluation of submitted proposals. As this is a public opportunity, it is anticipated that there will be a high number of artwork submissions, which will require a significant amount of time for the Art Advisory Group to review.

After exploration of several options of art media, and in consideration of fiscal limitations, the series of three 5' x 7' display light boxes at each of the three modular connectors in the RPT was presented to and approved by the Commission. Light boxes are commonly used in public art and offer an impressive and high quality, yet affordable, means to display all manner of 2-D artworks such as paintings, drawings, and photography which are reproduced as large scale back-lit transparencies.

Of the \$500,000 budget, the Commission approved \$200,600 for the design modifications and infrastructure. The remaining budget for project costs for this scope is \$299,400.

Content will focus on the history of the Airport, and/or a celebration of the unique character of the three cities that comprise the airport stewardship: Burbank, Glendale, and Pasadena. To coordinate and curate the ongoing rotation of the displays beyond the first installation, an on-call art consultant will be required as well as budget for scanning, printing and installation cost.

As requested by the Commission, estimates for various scenarios for a 6-year display period are listed below, with operating cost parsed out from the project costs. Scenario A is the proposal presented to the Commission on December 16, 2024. The estimates take into account artist fees, coordination, printing and installation costs as well as contingency and cost escalation (5% each year) beyond the first year. Scenarios C-E include costs for a repeat procurement after 3 years for comparative purposes.

Scenario C is recommended as it enables funding to go out to 18 artists and 1-year rotations. Scenarios D and E offer more expansive opportunities to commission artists or rotate displays but have high operating costs. In addition, rotating the artwork amongst the three locations can be difficult due to the fragility of the transparencies and requires a high level of coordination.

The RFQ will be issued to the broad artist community and will primarily focus on artistic merit, and the ability to create artwork for the enjoyment of others, and not public art experience or professional recognition. To furnish content for these displays, a pool of artists will be selected to create artworks that celebrate the rich aviation history of the Airport, and/or explore the unique characteristics of the Cities of Burbank, Glendale and Pasadena. Artists working in 2-D media, artists with little or no public art experience, and artists who identify as underrepresented, and those may have been impacted by the recent fires, will be encouraged to apply.

The opportunity will be advertised on local websites familiar to artists and the art community. In addition, outreach will be conducted through arts organizations, public libraries, and neighborhood networks within the Cities of Burbank, Glendale, and Pasadena. To help facilitate the artist application process and for ease of evaluating a large number of submittals, an online portfolio portal will be provided to supplement the Authority's standard procurement procedure via PlanetBids. The targeted local outreach will also apply to local firms that are able to supply photography, scanning, printing, and installations services.

Artist qualifications will be evaluated by the Art Advisory Group based on the artistic merit, originality, and appropriateness of their submitted portfolio of past work. The review will not require artists to provide evidence of previous public art experience. The top-ranking candidates will be shortlisted to develop site-specific artwork proposals, which will be evaluated for artistic merit, originality, and conceptual alignment with the project site and the Authority's vision. From the shortlist, the Art Advisory Group will recommend up to nine artists to the Commission. Final recommendations will be presented to the Commission for approval and to enter into agreements with the Authority.

After the first six years of display is complete and the original bank of artwork has been exhausted, the Commission will have the ability to procure a new set of artworks for the RPT.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that Commission authorize the project team to proceed with the issuance of the RFQ, and approve the proposed selection process, for procurement of artwork for the three modular connector locations in the RPT for a rotating display of curated art for a 3-year period based on Scenario C.

APPROVAL OF TASK ORDER AMENDMENT FOR THE REPLACEMENT PASSENGER TERMINAL PROJECT

SUMMARY

At its meeting on December 3, 2025, the Executive Committee ("Committee") voted (2-0, 1 absent) to recommend that the Commission consider a Task Order Amendment to the Guaranteed Maximum Price ("GMP") for Holder, Pankow, TEC – A Joint Venture ("HPTJV") for the following change:

1. **\$2,300,000** – Replacement Passenger Terminal ("RPT") Concession Underground Utilities Installation on a not-to-exceed ("NTE"), Time and Materials ("T&M") basis

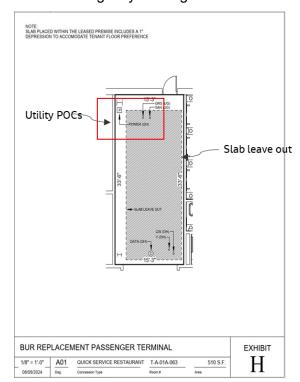
BACKGROUND

On December 19, 2022, the Commission awarded HPTJV a design-build agreement for the RPT Project. On May 6, 2024, the Commission approved a GMP with HPTJV for the RPT. Concurrently, the Commission approved the appropriation and expenditure authorization of a portion of the owner's contingency in the amount of \$28,235,082 subject to the Change Order approval process established by Resolution No. 499. That resolution authorizes the Executive Director to unilaterally approve the use of the owner's contingency for single

Change Orders that do not exceed \$500,000 and that collectively do not exceed 70% of the owner's contingency budget. The total amount allocated for owner's contingency is \$50,000,000 and \$13,290,569 has been authorized to date.

CONCESSIONS UNDERGROUND UTILITIES INSTALLATION

Because a majority of the RPT footprint is a slab-on-grade design, underground utility placement is a critical activity. The RPT base building design was completed prior to the award of the retail and food service concession contracts. To provide flexibility to the concessionaires, the final concrete slabs were left out of the concession areas where additional underground utilities were needed. Points of connection ("POCs") to the various utilities were identified on the drawings with the Food Service and Retail Concessions Request for Proposals ("RFP"). An example drawing from the RFP showing the slab leave out area and utility POCs for one concession area is shown to the right. The RFP informed proposers that the concessionaires must



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design their underground utilities to fall within the concrete leave out areas connecting to the POCs provided. The concessionaires were further required to complete the underground utility drawings by March 2025.

ISSUE

In June 2025, it was learned that the underground utilities for the Food and Beverage Concessionaire, MCS Burbank LLC ("MCS"), were not completed. It also was learned that the existing MCS design was not consistent with the contract requirements for all units. Staff, Jacobs Project Management Co. ("Jacobs"), and the Authority's concessions project management firm then worked with MCS to complete the underground utility design. The final underground utility drawings were not completed until September. The late completion eliminated any potential for HPTJV to adjust the slab leave-outs for MCS's contractors.

The late and non-compliant drawings have created a requirement for saw cutting, trenching, and reworking of a number of areas within the RPT. This introduces significant risks to the project including:

- Out-of-sequence work potentially disrupting MEP systems, general contractor workflow, and inspection sequencing.
- Tight terminal corridors and shared access zones create logistical and safety challenges.
- Increased risks of delays, rework, damage to adjacent systems, and cost escalation.

SOLUTION

Options:

Staff and Jacobs have identified two options for completing MCS's underground utilities installation.

- 1. Allow MCS's contractor to come in after HPTJV has completed the area.
- 2. Direct HPTJV to install the underground utilities per MCS's design.

To not interfere with HPTJV's schedule, MCS's contractor could not begin the underground utility work until the end of March 2026. This delay adds a minimum four-to-six-weeks schedule risk for the project. Without early underground utility work, MCS would need to perform demolition, rough-in, inspections, and pour-backs of slabs during tenant improvement activities. This would place the concessions utilities on the critical path. Delaying the work to have MCS's contractor perform would also add risks of damage to base-building finishes and systems from demolition and rework.

Costs:

MCS has provided a cost estimate of \$1.1 million to perform the work. Jacobs has identified inconsistencies in this estimate.

- MCS assumed utility work would remain within the slab leave out areas. This
 is inconsistent with MCS's final design showing underground utilities in areas
 where slabs have already been poured requiring saw cutting, trenching and
 repouring.
- Added construction demolition and material haul-off and disposal was not included in MCS's estimate.

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- The work requires more extensive utility rerouting and trenching than originally anticipated.
- The estimate did not include increased restoration requirements, including thicker slab sections, reinforcement and finish protection.

HPTJV has provided a cost estimate of \$2.3 million based on solicitation and receipt of subcontractor bids for the work.

RECOMMENDATION

After consideration of the risks and costs associated with the alternative solutions, Staff and Jacobs recommend that HPTJV be assigned the responsibility of completing MCS's underground utilities. Staff and Jacobs believe that this alternative will:

- Reduce the potential schedule risks associated with delaying until MCS's contractor can perform the work.
- Protect the integrity of the base building systems and finishes, which will
 preserve warranties and avoid future disagreements related to potential
 damage.

Approving this Task Order Amendment will allow HPTJV to initiate the work this month and complete it well ahead of the March 2026 shared-access period for tenant build-out.

COST CONTROL RECOMMENDATION

Based on the significant differences between the MCS estimate and the HPTJV subcontractor bids, Staff and Jacobs recommend performing portions of the work on a T&M basis with an NTE value rather than lump sum for the following reasons:

- 1. Variable Quantities Across F&B Units: The HPTJV subcontractor bids may not have adequately accounted for the differences in each concession area.
 - Each concession requires different trench lengths and demolition volumes.
 - Final routing varies by unit based on equipment, utilities, and adjacency.
- 2. Immediate Mobilization
 - Lump-sum pricing requires detailed bid solicitations and lengthy negotiations.
 - T&M allows work to start in December without waiting for redesigns or pricing cycles.
- 3. Strict Oversight
 - Jacobs will provide daily site presence to verify crew sizes, hours, equipment, and materials.
 - Jacobs will sign every T&M ticket for transparency and auditability.
- 4. Pay Only for Actual Work Performed
- 5. Avoids Potentially Inflated Lump-Sum Contingencies
 - Field adjustments can be made without numerous change orders.
- 6. Protect the Authority from Cost Surprises
 - Real-time tracking ensures expenditures align with actual production.

FUNDING

The adopted FY 2026 budget can accommodate the proposed Task Order Amendment through the owner's contingency. MCS will pay a minimum of \$1.1 million of the costs associated with this Task Order Amendment. Staff will report back to the Commission with the final cost after the scope of work has been completed.

RECOMMENDATION

At its meeting on December 3, 2025, the Committee voted (2-0, 1 absent) for Staff to present this Task Order Amendment to the Commission for consideration in the not-to-exceed amount of \$2,300,000 for HPTJV to install the MCS concession lease spaces underground utilities in the RPT.

Subject: Notification of HPTJV Change Order Approvals for Garage Valet Entrance Redesign and Construction

On May 6, 2024, the Commission approved a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) with Holder, Pankow, TEC – A Joint Venture (HPTJV) for the Replacement Passenger Terminal (RPT) Project. Concurrently, the Commission approved the appropriation and expenditure authorization of a portion of the owner's contingency in the amount of \$28,235,082 subject to the Change Order approval process established by Resolution No. 499. That resolution authorizes the Executive Director to unilaterally approve the use of the Owner's Contingency for single Change Orders that do not exceed \$500,000 and that collectively do not exceed 70% of the owner's contingency budget. The resolution requires the Executive Director to notify the Commission in writing within 24 hours of each approval of a Change Order exceeding \$150,000.

Per Resolution No. 499, please be advised that I approved a Change Order of \$494,639 on November 24, 2025, for construction costs associated with the garage valet entrance. Additionally, Frank Miller approved a Change Order of \$323,868 on November 7, 2024, copy attached, for redesign costs associated with the garage valet entrance bringing the total for the valet redesign and construction to \$818,507. To date, \$12,795,930 of the Owner's Contingency has been authorized.

These Change Orders provide for an extension of the dedicated transit lane at the north end of the garage. This modification was required based on the City of Burbank's interpretation of Condition of Approval #41 in the Development Agreement. The City Planning Department determined that the original transit lane length was insufficient and requested removal of valet traffic from the transit lane. Consequently, the valet entrance was relocated from the north to the south end of the garage, allowing for a longer dedicated transit lane at the north end. The RPT Project Management Team (Jacobs) reviewed the Change Order proposal and recommended authorizing the cost for the construction scope.

The resolution requires the Executive Director to notify the Commission in writing within 24 hours of approval of a Change Order exceeding \$150,000.

Per Resolution No. 499, please be advised that I approved a Change Order in the amount of \$323,868 related to redesign of the garage valet entrance. The redesign is necessary to satisfy Burbank staff's interpretation of Condition of Approval #41 for the RPT Project. That condition requires construction of a dedicated transit lane into the RPT. The HPTJV drawings submitted to Burbank Planning Department for permitting included a dedicated transit lane. However, Burbank staff requested significant changes to the design which requires the valet entrance to be relocated to the south end of the garage allowing for a longer dedicated transit lane at the north end of the garage. The RPT Project Management Team (Jacobs) reviewed HPTJV's Change Order proposal and recommended authorizing the cost for the redesign.

The cost of construction work related to the redesign of the parking garage will exceed \$500,000. Staff will return to the Commission requesting approval of additional owner's contingency to fund the construction.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

(Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority / Barich, Inc.)

THIS PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is dated December 15, 2025 for reference purposes and is executed by the Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena Airport Authority ("Authority"), a California joint powers agency, and Barich, Inc. ("Consultant"), an Arizona corporation.

RECITALS

- A. The Authority owns and operates the Bob Hope Airport (commonly known as Hollywood Burbank Airport) ("Airport") and desires to retain Consultant as an independent contractor to provide the following professional services: private wireless consulting services.
- B. Consultant represents that it is fully qualified to perform such work by virtue of the training and experience of its personnel.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

- **1. Definitions.** In addition to the terms defined above, the following definitions shall apply for purposes of this Agreement:
- A. "Airport Rules and Regulations": July 1, 2023 Airport Rules and Regulations or any successor adopted by the Authority Commission.
 - B. "Commencement Date": December 15, 2025.
- C. "Contract Administrator": Kimberley Parker-Polito or a duly authorized designee.
 - D. "Contract Limit": \$339,739.00.
 - E. "Executive Director": John T. Hatanaka or a duly authorized designee.
 - F. "Expiration Date": December 14, 2028.
- G. "Federal Requirements" the federal requirements set forth in the attached Exhibit D, which requirements are applicable to projects not funded by an Airport Improvement Program grant from the Federal Aviation Administration.
 - H. "Fee Schedule": the fee schedule set forth in the attached Exhibit B.
- I. "Indemnitees": the Authority, TBI, the Cities of Burbank, Glendale and Pasadena, and the respective officers, agents, employees and volunteers of each such entity.

- J. "Insurance Requirements": the insurance requirements set forth in the attached Exhibit C.
- K. "Liabilities": any actual, alleged, or threatened causes of action, claims, costs, damages, demands, expenses (including fees of accountants, attorneys, and other professionals), judgments, liens, losses, penalties, and proceedings of any nature whatsoever.
 - L. "Services": the tasks set forth in the attached Exhibit A.
 - M. "TBI": TBI Airport Management, Inc.

2. Services.

- A. Consultant shall perform the Services in a timely, regular basis in accordance with the Federal Requirements and applicable laws. Time is of the essence in the performance of this Agreement.
- B. Consultant shall perform all work to the highest professional standards and in a manner reasonably satisfactory to the Authority. Consultant shall consult the Contract Administrator for any decisions that must be made by the Authority. Consultant shall promptly notify the Contract Administrator of any unsafe condition that Consultant discovers at the Airport.
- C. In the event any claim is brought against the Authority relating to Consultant's performance of the Services, Consultant shall provide any reasonable assistance and cooperation that the Authority might require.

3. Term.

- A. This Agreement shall commence on the Commencement Date and shall expire on the Expiration Date unless earlier terminated.
- B. If Consultant breaches this Agreement and fails to cure such breach within seven days of written notice from the Contract Administrator, then the Authority may immediately terminate this Agreement for cause. Either party may terminate this Agreement for convenience upon 15 days prior written notice to the other party.

4. Compensation.

- A. The Authority shall compensate Consultant for performance of the Services, and Consultant agrees to accept as full satisfaction for such work, payment according to the Fee Schedule. In no event shall the compensation payable to Consultant under this Agreement exceed the Contract Limit.
- B. Consultant shall submit monthly invoices to the Authority for the Services. Each invoice shall itemize the work performed during the billing period and the amount due. Within

- 10 business days of receipt of each invoice, the Authority shall notify Consultant in writing of any disputed amounts on the invoice. Within 30 calendar days of receipt of each invoice, the Authority shall pay all undisputed amounts on the invoice. The Authority shall not withhold applicable taxes or other authorized deductions from the payments, and Consultant shall pay all required taxes on the payments.
- 5. Independent Contractor Status. Consultant is, and shall at all times remain as to the Authority, an independent contractor. Consultant shall have no power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability on behalf of the Authority or to act otherwise on behalf of the Authority as an agent. Neither the Authority nor any of its officers, employees, agents or volunteers shall have control over the conduct of Consultant except as set forth in this Agreement.
- 6. Airport Rules and Regulations. Consultant shall comply with the Airport Rules and Regulations. Consultant acknowledges that the Airport Rules and Regulations are available on the Authority's webpage (hollywoodburbankairport.com), and Consultant may obtain a hard copy from the Authority upon request. Violations of the Airport Rules and Regulations by Consultant or its personnel shall be punishable as stated in the Airport Rules and Regulations including by administrative fines.
- 7. Work Product Ownership. All reports, documents, or other written material developed by Consultant in the performance of this Agreement shall be and remain the property of the Authority without limitation upon use or dissemination by the Authority.
- **8.** Confidentiality. Consultant shall preserve the confidentiality of all nonpublic data, documents, discussion or other information that is developed or received by it in connection with this Agreement. Consultant shall not disclose such information without the prior written authorization of the Executive Director. Upon request, all Authority data shall be returned to the Authority at expiration or termination of this Agreement. Consultant's obligations under this section shall survive expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- 9. Conflict of Interest. Consultant shall not maintain or acquire any financial interest that may be affected by the Services. Consultant shall avoid the appearance of having any financial interest that would conflict in any manner with the Services.

10. Indemnification.

- A. Consultant shall defend, hold harmless, and indemnify the Indemnitees from and against any Liabilities that arise out of the acts or omissions of Consultant or its subcontractors in connection with this Agreement.
- B. Consultant's obligations under this section shall survive expiration or termination of this Agreement, and shall apply regardless of whether or not any insurance policies are determined to be applicable to the Liabilities.
- C. Consultant's obligations under this section shall apply, without limitation, to Liabilities that partially involve active or passive negligence by the Authority. However,

Consultant's obligations under this section shall not apply to Liabilities that arise from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the Authority, as determined by final arbitration or court decision or by consensus of the parties.

- 11. **Insurance.** Without limiting Consultant's defense, hold harmless, and indemnification obligations under this Agreement, Consultant shall maintain policies of insurance as specified in the Insurance Requirements.
- 12. **Suspension.** The Contract Administrator may suspend all or any part of the Services for the Authority's convenience or for work stoppages beyond the control of the parties. Written notice of a suspension shall be given to Consultant.
- 13. Notices. Any notices, invoices, or other documents related to this Agreement shall be deemed received on: (a) the day of delivery, if delivered by hand during the receiving party's regular business hours or by e-mail before or during the receiving party's regular business hours; (b) the business day after delivery, if delivered by e-mail after the receiving party's regular business hours; or (c) on the second business day following deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid, to the addresses listed below, or to such other addresses as the parties may, from time to time, designate in writing. Any notice delivered by e-mail that concerns breach or termination of this Agreement shall concurrently be sent by deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid but such notice shall be deemed received on the day of e-mail delivery.

- 14. Assignability. Consultant shall not assign, transfer or subcontract any interest in this Agreement or the performance of any of its obligations without the Executive Director's prior written consent. This prohibition is not intended to preclude, and shall not be interpreted as precluding, Consultant from utilizing subcontractors identified in Consultant's proposal for the Services. Any attempt by Consultant to assign, transfer or subcontract any rights, duties or obligations in violation of this prohibition shall be void.
- Litigation. In the event that either party shall commence legal action to enforce or **15.** interpret this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its costs of suit including reasonable attorneys' fees. The venue for litigation shall be Los Angeles County, The interpretation of this Agreement shall not be resolved by any rules of construction providing for interpretation against the party who causes the uncertainty to exist or against the party who drafted the disputed language.
- **16. Exhibits.** Exhibits A through D are incorporated into this Agreement by reference. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of Exhibits A through C, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail. In the event

of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of Exhibit D, the provisions of Exhibit D shall prevail.

- 17. Incorporation of Mandatory Language. Each and every provision required by law to be inserted in this Agreement shall be deemed to be inserted and this Agreement shall be read and enforced as though such provision were included. If through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted, or is not correctly inserted, then upon request of either party this Agreement shall promptly be amended to make such insertion or correction.
- 18. Entire Agreement. This Agreement (and the attached Exhibits) represents the entire and integrated contract between the parties regarding the Services. This Agreement supersedes all prior oral or written negotiations, representations and contracts related to the Services. This Agreement may not be amended, nor any provision or breach waived, except in a writing that is signed by the parties and that expressly refers to this Agreement.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF SERVICES

The selected Respondent (Consultant) shall provide the following services to support the implementation of a Private Wireless Network (PWN) at the Airport:

- Create a process for Use Case identification and prioritization to address immediate priority
 of perimeter security and future use cases to include the entire BUR airport operation and
 monetization objectives.
- Prepare network design, requirements and architecture for the BUR PWN.
- Develop comprehensive RFP documentation for functional and non-functional PWN requirements and total cost of ownership templates for BUR PWN solution to be released to potential proposers for PWN solution.
- Conduct an evaluation of the proposers' proposals relating to compliance with RFP and cost submissions to ultimately work with the Authority to select a preferred BUR PWN solution and managed services provider.
- Define the components of a BUR PWN Pilot program to support BUR priority use case(s) and provide consultancy services to manage the execution of the BUR PWN Pilot program.
- Provide support for BUR PWN contractual discussions with the preferred PWN solution managed services provider.
- Provide support for deployment of BUR PWN through the services for deployment program management.
- Provide on-going consultancy services support to BUR for the optimization and benchmarking of the deployed BUR PWN.
- Provide expert technical oversight / project management services of the selected proposer for the BUR PWN solution to ensure the installation meets the stated requirements, track the scope, schedule, and budget, and keep the Airport Authority's interests at the forefront. This is particularly important since there are several different components to even a simple Private Wireless Network installation that must be designed, permitted, installed, tested, and operationalized. For example, Consultant must ensure the new cameras are properly integrated with the existing video management system.

As the Airport Authority's representative, Consultant shall: drive toward achieving the desired outcomes, ensuring these outcomes are embedded throughout the entire project cycle; help ensure vendor(s) and contractor teams are aligned to deliver outcomes and payments are dependent upon outcome success; and keep Airport Authority leadership informed on how the project is delivering the desired value, and escalate issues as needed and as proactively as possible.

Additional Information (Services)

The following applies to this Scope of Services:

- All work is planned to be completed off-site except for the following planned travel: one or two members travel on-site in Task 1-, and one-member travel on-site once or twice in Task 3.
- The fee schedule provided in Exhibit B is designed to allow for the completion of the tasks outlined in this Scope. However, if other significant efforts are needed and durations extend over the course of the project, the Consultant will notify the Airport Authority of the gap to determine if additional scoping of services is required. Additionally, should the procurement effort for the PWN solution be canceled and rereleased for any reason, the Consultant will work with the Authority's point of contact to determine the impacts to the scope and timing of Consultant's services.

EXHIBIT C Insurance Requirements

- 1. Consultant shall obtain, provide, and maintain policies of insurance as specified below.
- A. General Liability Insurance. Consultant shall maintain commercial general liability insurance in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 general aggregate, for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage.
- B. Automobile Liability Insurance. Consultant shall maintain automobile insurance covering bodily injury and property damage for all activities of Consultant arising out of or in connection with the Services, including coverage for any owned, hired, non-owned or rented vehicles, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit for each accident.
- C. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance. Consultant shall maintain professional liability insurance that covers the Services in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 per claim and in the aggregate. Any policy inception date, continuity date, or retroactive date must be before the Commencement Date and Consultant shall maintain continuous coverage through a period of no less than three years after expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- D. Workers' Compensation/Employer's Liability Insurance. Consultant shall maintain workers' compensation insurance (statutory limits) and employer's liability insurance with limits of at least \$1,000,000.
- 2. The insurance policy or policies shall contain, or shall be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
- A. General liability policies shall provide or be endorsed to provide: (i) that the Indemnitees shall be additional insureds; and (ii) a waiver of subrogation in favor of additional insureds. This provision shall also apply to any excess/umbrella liability policies.
- B. A severability of interests provision must apply for all additional insureds ensuring that Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the insurer's limits of liability. The policy(ies) shall not contain any cross-liability exclusions.
- C. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to the Indemnitees.
- D. For any claims related to this Agreement, Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Indemnitees. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Indemnitees shall be excess of Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

- E. The limits of insurance may be satisfied by a combination of primary and umbrella or excess insurance. Any umbrella or excess insurance shall contain or be endorsed to contain a provision that such coverage shall also apply on a primary and non-contributory basis for the benefit of each Indemnitee before the Indemnitee's own insurance or self-insurance shall be called upon to protect it as a named insured.
- F. Any failure to comply with reporting or other provisions of the policy, including breaches of warranties, shall not affect coverage provided to the Indemnitees.
- G. Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- H. The policy shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled by either party, or reduced in coverage or in limits except after 30 calendar days (10 calendar days in the event of non-payment of premium) prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Authority.
- I. Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the State of California with a minimum current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:X, unless waived by the Contract Administrator. An exception to this standard will be made for the State Compensation Insurance Fund when not specifically rated.
- J. Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the Contract Administrator. At the option of the Contract Administrator, either the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as respects the Indemnitees, or Consultant shall provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to the Contract Administrator guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration and defense expenses.
- K. The workers' compensation insurer agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against the Authority for injuries to employees of Consultant resulting from work for the Authority or use of the Airport.
- 3. Requirements of specific coverage features or limits are not intended as a limitation on coverage, limits, or other requirements, or as a waiver of any coverage normally provided by any insurance. Specific reference to a given coverage feature is for clarification purposes only as it pertains to a given issue and is not intended by any party or insured to be all inclusive, or to the exclusion of other coverage, or a waiver of any type. If Consultant maintains higher limits than the minimum specified above, the Authority requires and shall be entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the Authority.
- 4. Consultant shall furnish to the Authority an original certificate or certificates of insurance and amendatory endorsements showing that required policies are in effect in the required amounts and, as to the workers' compensation insurance, with the required waiver of

subrogation. The certificates and endorsements must be received and approved by the Contract Administrator prior to commencement of work. The Authority reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies at any time.

- 5. Consultant shall ensure that its subcontractors provide the same minimum insurance coverage and endorsements required of Consultant. Consultant shall monitor and review all such coverage, and Consultant assumes all responsibility for ensuring that such coverage is provided. Upon request, Consultant shall submit all subcontractor agreements to the Authority for review.
- 6. In the event any policy of insurance does not comply with these requirements or is cancelled and not replaced, the Authority has the right but not the duty to obtain the insurance it deems necessary. Any premium paid by the Authority in such event shall be promptly reimbursed by Consultant or the Authority shall withhold from its payments to Consultant an amount sufficient to pay that premium.
- 7. The Authority reserves the right at any time to change the amounts and types of required insurance by giving Consultant 90 days notice of such change. If such change results in substantial additional cost to Consultant, then the parties shall renegotiate Consultant's compensation.

EXHIBIT D

Non-AIP Project Federal Requirements

1. General Civil Rights Provisions

- C. The above provision binds the Contractor and subcontractors from the bid solicitation period through the completion of the contract.

2. <u>Civil Rights – Title VI Assurance</u>

- A. During the performance of this contract, the Contractor, for itself, its assignees, and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor") agrees to comply with the following non-discrimination statutes and authorities; including but not limited to:
- 1. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 USC § 2000d et seq., 78 stat. 252) (prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin);
- 2. 49 CFR part 21 (Non-discrimination in Federally-Assisted programs of the Department of Transportation—Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964);
- 3. The Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, (42 USC § 4601) (prohibits unfair treatment of persons displaced or whose property has been acquired because of Federal or Federal-aid programs and projects);
- 4. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 USC § 794 et seq.), as amended (prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability); and 49 CFR part 27 (Nondiscrimination on the Basis of Disability in Programs or Activities Receiving Federal Financial Assistance);
- 5. The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 USC § 6101 et seq.) (prohibits discrimination on the basis of age);
- 6. Airport and Airway Improvement Act of 1982 (49 USC § 47123), as amended (prohibits discrimination based on race, creed, color, national origin, or sex);

- 7. The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 (PL 100-259) (broadened the scope, coverage and applicability of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, by expanding the definition of the terms "programs or activities" to include all of the programs or activities of the Federal-aid recipients, sub-recipients and contractors, whether such programs or activities are Federally funded or not);
- 8. Titles II and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 USC § 12101, et seq) (prohibit discrimination on the basis of disability in the operation of public entities, public and private transportation systems, places of public accommodation, and certain testing entities) as implemented by U.S. Department of Transportation regulations at 49 CFR parts 37 and 38;

- 2. 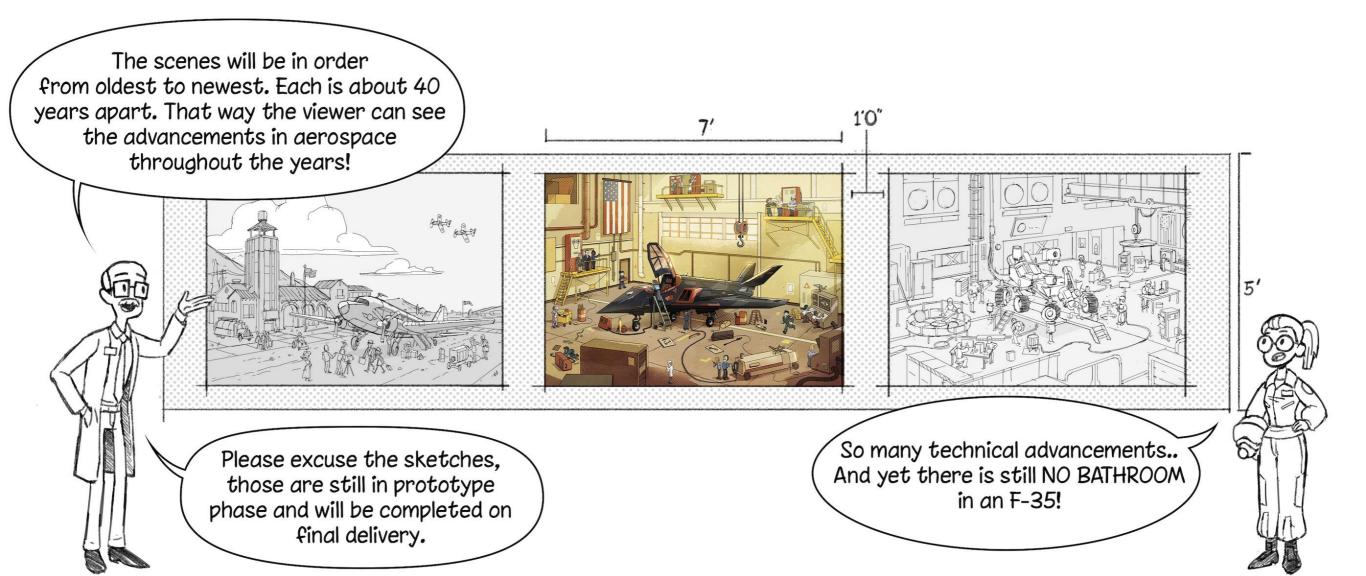

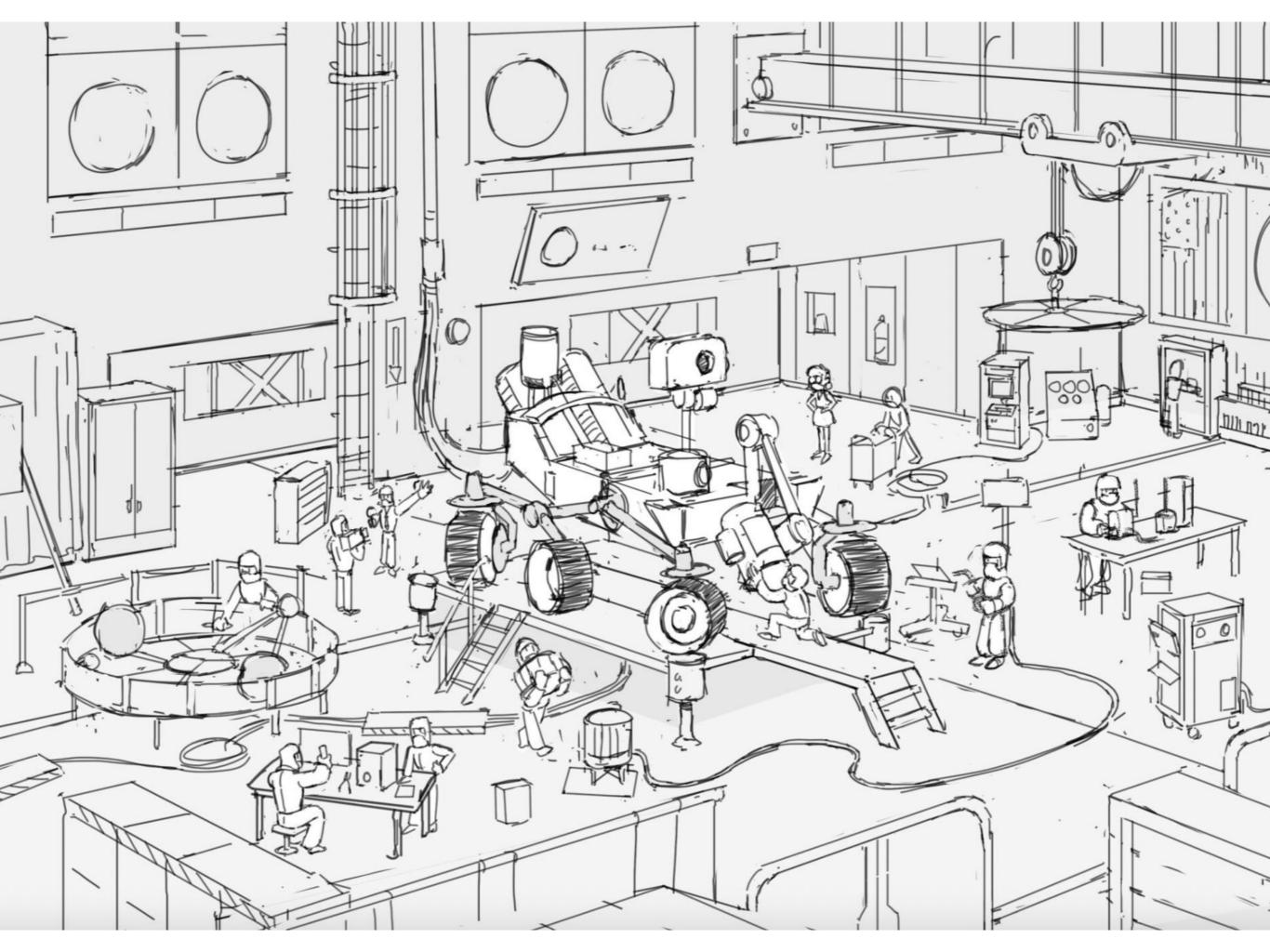
Brent Noll

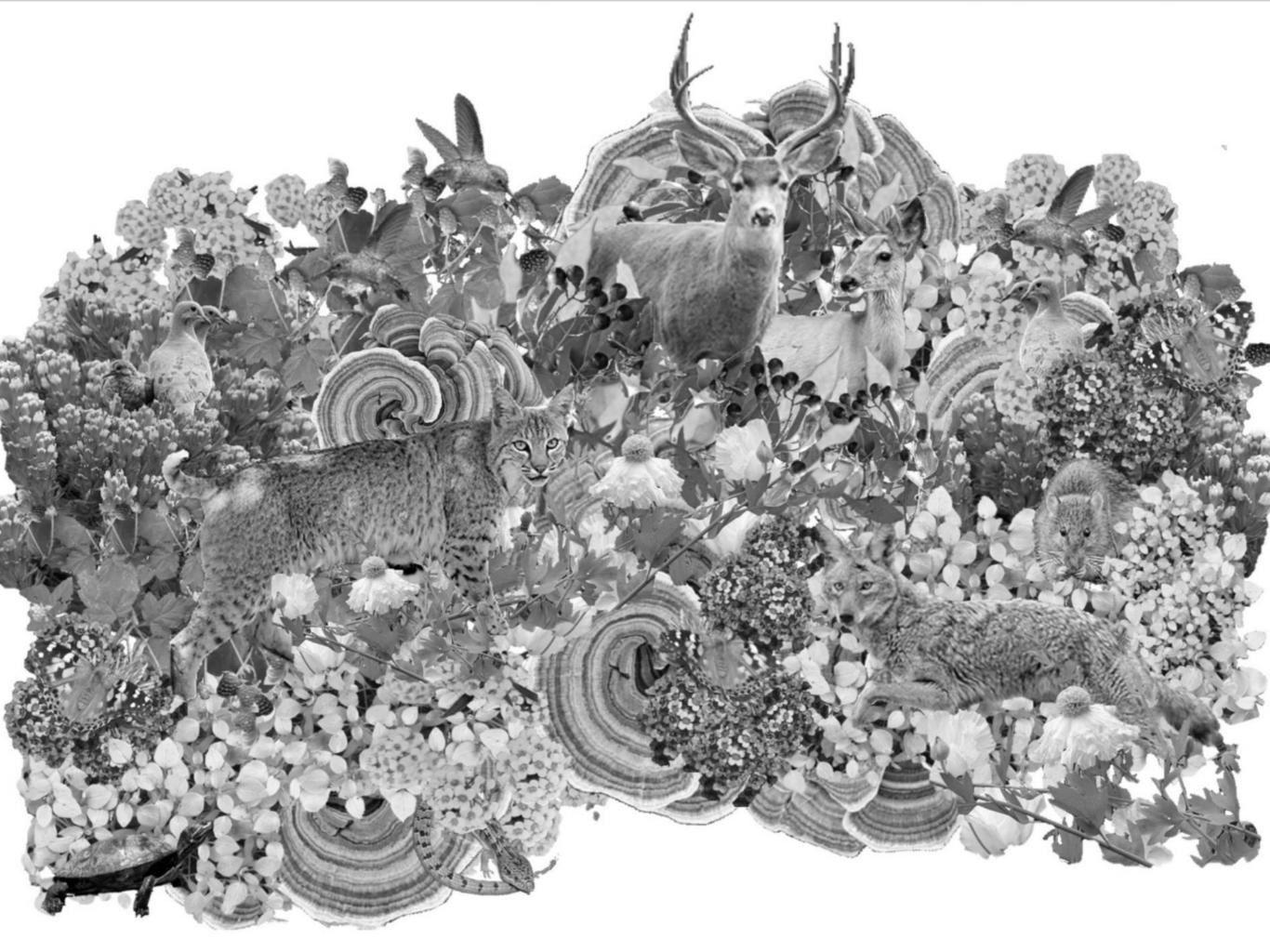














Matthew Brandt

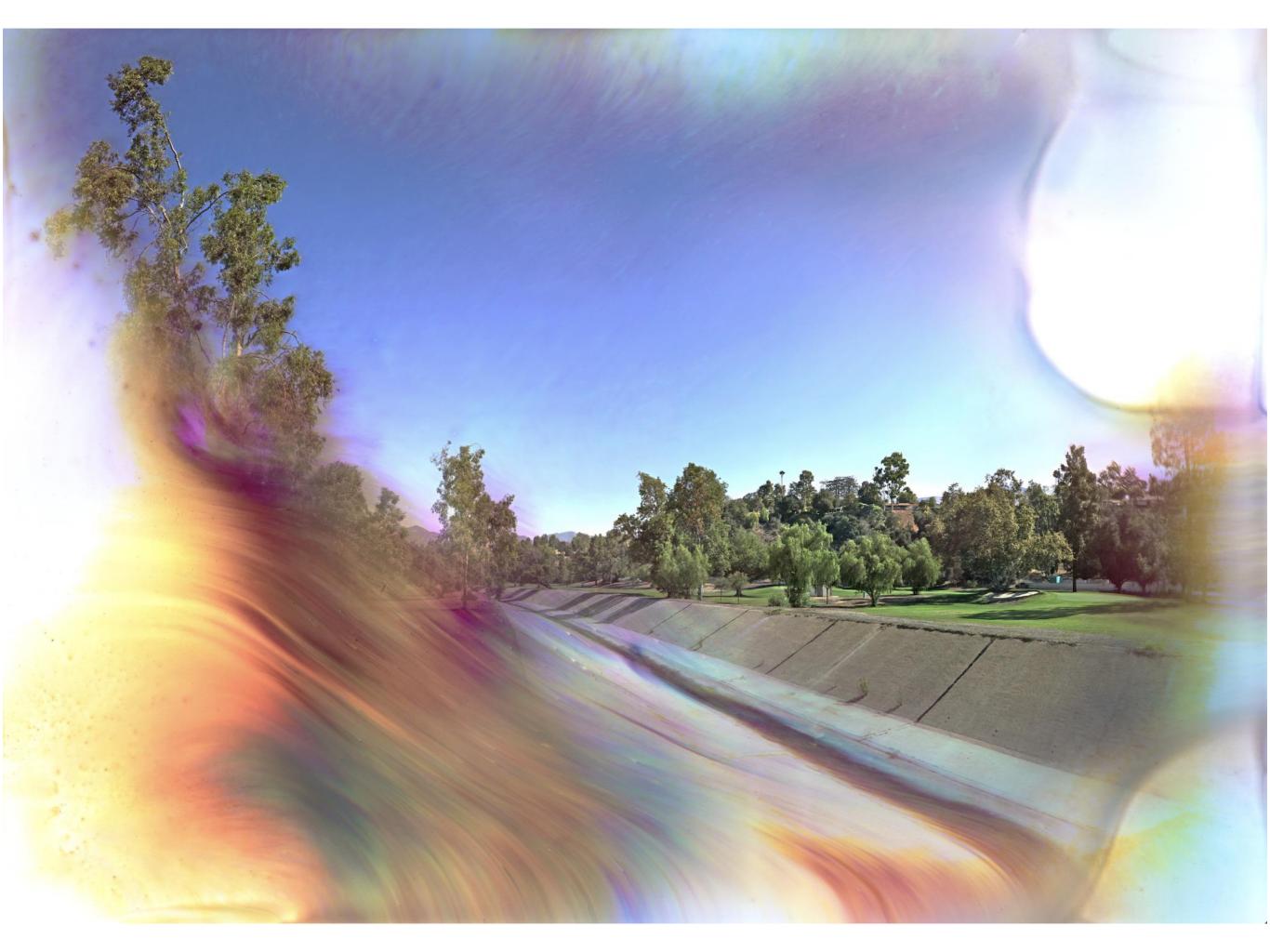

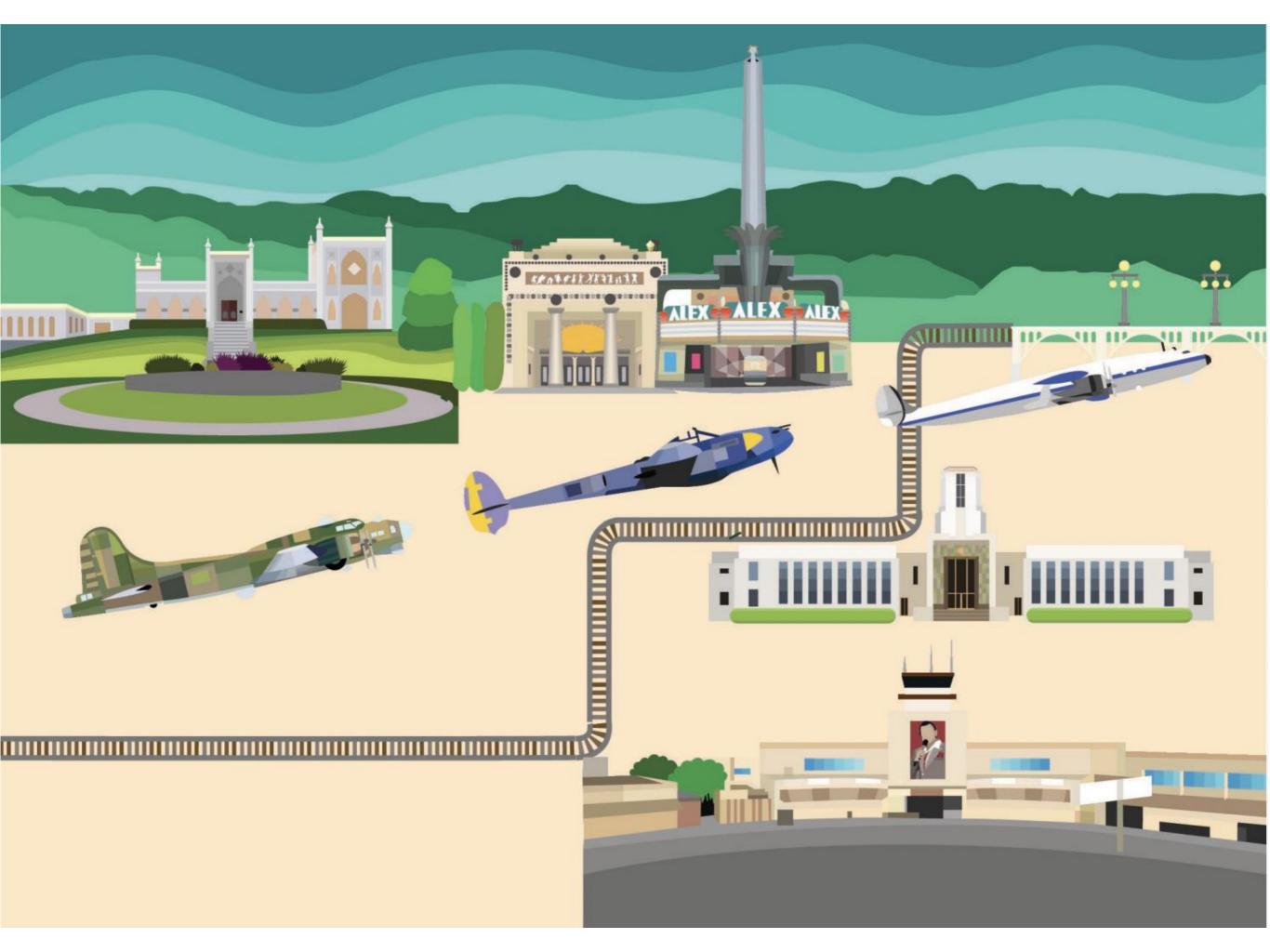

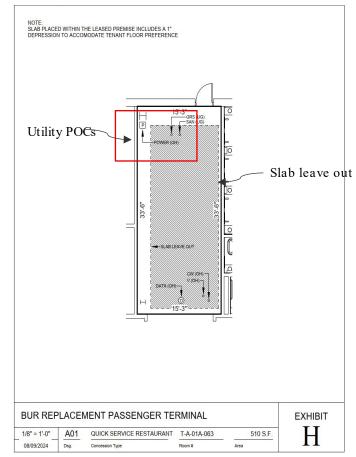

Background

- Because of the slab on grade design of most of the RPT, underground utility placement is a critical activity.
- The base building design was completed prior to the award of the retail and food and beverage concession contracts.
- To provide flexibility to the concessionaires, the final concrete slabs were left out of the concession areas where additional underground utilities were needed. Points of connection to the various utilities were identified on the drawings within the concessions Request for Proposals (RFP). The RFP stated that the concessionaires were required to design their utilities to fall within the concrete leave out areas connecting to the POCs provided.
- The concessionaire was required to complete the underground utility drawings in March of 2025 to allow the base building contractor the ability to complete the utilities.
- MCS has just recently completed final, fully coordinated concession designs...
 - MCS' underground utility requirements extend outside original slab leave -outs in every unit. Leave-outs were intentionally generous but based on best-available information early in the project. Final designs require utilities to shift beyond these openings, requiring additional concrete removal and trenching, as well as additional work reestablishing the vapor barrier in the building.
- Performing this work during tenant fit out introduces significant risks.
 - Demolition of newly completed floors and finishes would be required to reach utilities.
 - Out-of-sequence work disrupts MEP systems, general contractor workflow, and inspection sequencing.
 - Tight terminal corridors and shared access zones create logistical and safety challenges.
 - Increased risk of delays, rework, damage to adjacent systems, and cost escalation.

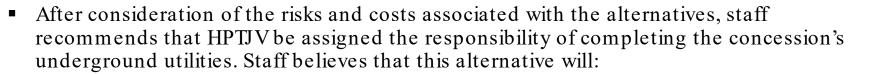
Installation of concession underground utilities has become a potential critical path issue.



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Alternatives

- BGPAA's Project Management Team (PMT) identified two basic approaches to completing the underground utility installation.
 - Allow the concessionaire's contractor to come in after the base building contractor has completed the area.
 - Direct the base building contractor to install the underground utilities pert the concessionaire's design.



- Reduce the potential schedule risks associated with delaying until the concessionaire's contractor can complete the work.
- Protect the integrity of the base building systems and finishes preserveing warranties and preventing potential future conflicts related to damages.



Cost/Schedule

Costs

- HPTJV has provided an estimate for the work of \$2.3 million.
- MCS has indicated that they believe they can perform the underground utility work at a cost significantly below HPTJV's estimate.
- Jacobs has reviewed MCS's proposed costs and has prepared an independent cost estimate for the work.
- Jacobs has reviewed the HPTJV and MCS estimates and has identified several key reasons for the cost differences.
 - MCS assumed utility work remained inside leave-outs, minimizing demolition..
 - Final design shows utilities extending outside leave-outs in every unit.
 - Added concrete demolition and haul-off not included in MCS assumptions.
 - More extensive utility rerouting and trenching than originally anticipated.
 - Increased restoration requirements, including thicker slab sections, reinforcement, and finish protection.
 - HPTJV must coordinate within an active terminal construction environment, which impacts labor efficiency and sequencing.

Schedule

- To maintain the schedule, the underground utility work should be performed over December 2025 January 2026 for the following reasons.
 - This time sits between major base-build finish milestones, minimizing conflict with other trades.
 - Allows utilities to be installed before terrazzo, partitions, ceilings, and fireproofing are completed.
 - Avoids working around finished surfaces, minimizing risk to quality and safety.
- Strategic early execution
 - Ensures slab areas are opened, trenched, and restored before restricted-access periods begin.
 - Avoids working around finished surfaces, minimizing risk to quality and safety.

Recommendations

Because of the potential risks to the base building associated with the additional underground utility installation, BGPAA staff and the PMT recommend the base building contractor install the underground utilities per the concessionaire's design for the following reasons:

- Having the base building contractor perform the work allows the completion of the underground utility installation early, ahead of shared access.
- Reduces destructive work during fit-out, demolition of floors would be required to reach utilities.
- Out of sequence work disrupts MEP systems, general contractor workflow, and increases risk of conflicts with other base building trades.
- Eliminates 4–6 weeks of schedule risk for the concessionaire.
- Protects base building finishes from demolition and rework.
- Supports overall terminal opening schedule and maintains operational integrity.

Recommendations (Continued)

Cost Control

- HPTJV has provided an upper limit cost for this change of approximately \$2.3 million. This number includes costs from their core trade subcontractors.
- Jacobs has validated and concurs with several of the trade costs. However, there are several trade costs which appear to be significantly higher than anticipated. The unit rates appear to be reasonable. The estimated effort for several tasks appear high.
- To control costs Jacobs proposes that some of the change work be performed on a Time & Material basis rather than a lump sum basis for the following reasons:
 - T&M is appropriate due to variable quantities across units
 - Each concession requires different lengths of trenching and varying demolition volumes.
 - Final routing varies by unit depending on equipment, utilities, and adjacency.
 - Allows immediate mobilization and avoids delay
 - Lump-sum pricing would require detailed RFPs and extensive pre-negotiation
 - T&M enables work to start in December without waiting for formalized redesigns or pricing cycles.

- Jacobs will provide strict oversight
 - Daily site presence ensures verification of crew sizes, hours, equipment, and materials.
 - Jacobs will sign every T&M ticket to maintain transparent and auditable cost control.
- Ensures project pays only for actual work performed
- Reduces risk of inflated contingency within a lump-sum number.
 - Allows field adjustments without generating numerous change orders.
- Protects BGPAA from cost surprises
 - Real-time tracking ensures expenditures align with actual production.

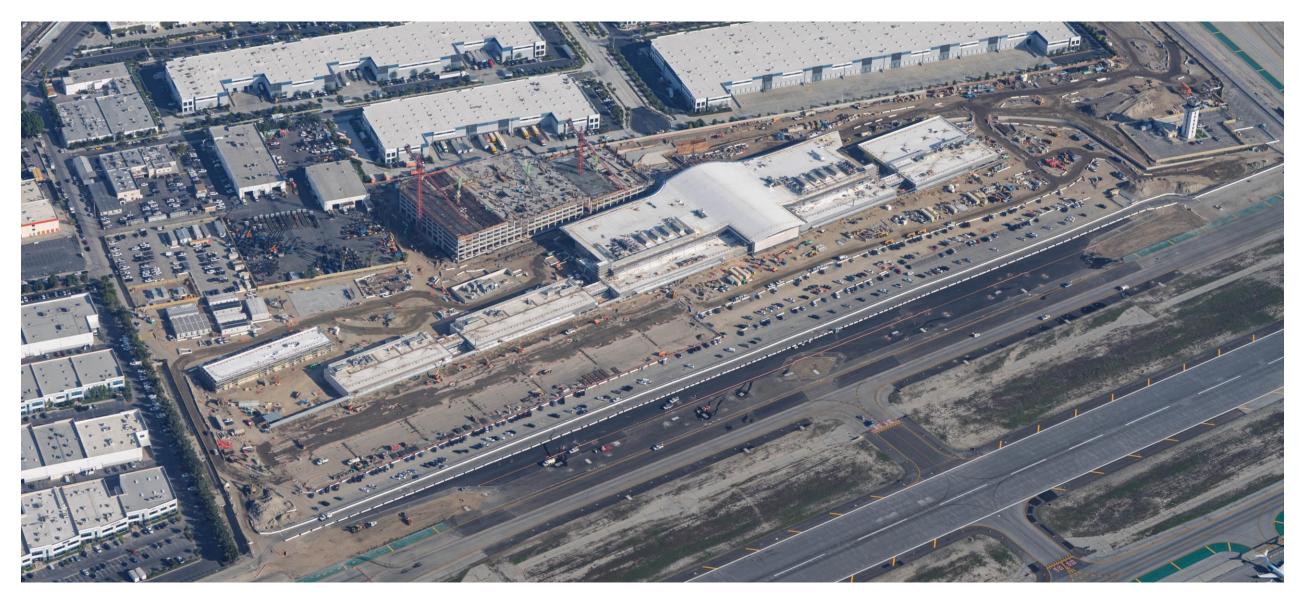
Summary

- Concessionaire underground utilities have become a potential critical path issue.
- Two potential alternatives were identified to complete the underground utilities
 - 1. Have the concessionaire's contractor complete the utilities
 - 2. Direct the base building contractor to complete the work
- To maintain the integrity of the base building and reduce potential schedule risks, staff recommends the second alternative
- Elements of the work will be performed under a Time and Materials basis with daily oversite to monitor costs providing transparent and auditable cost control.
- MCS will pay for approximately \$1.1 million of the costs
- The remaining costs will be taken from the Owner's contingency

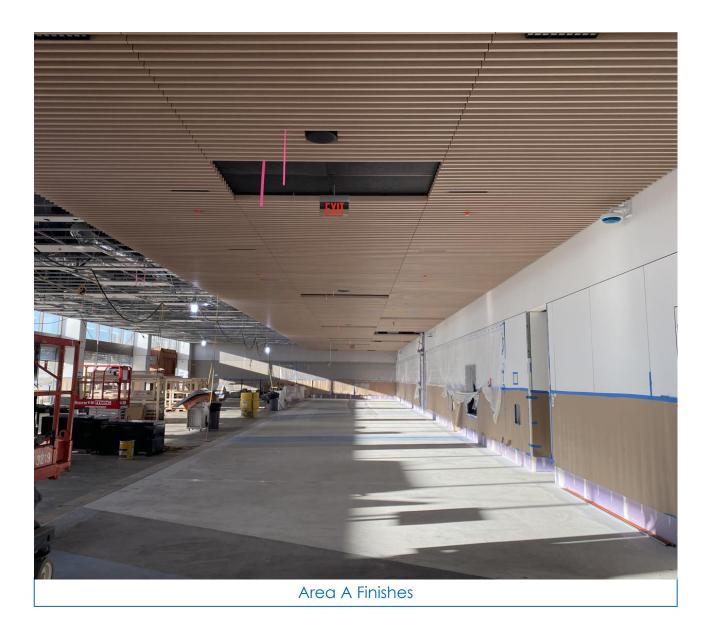

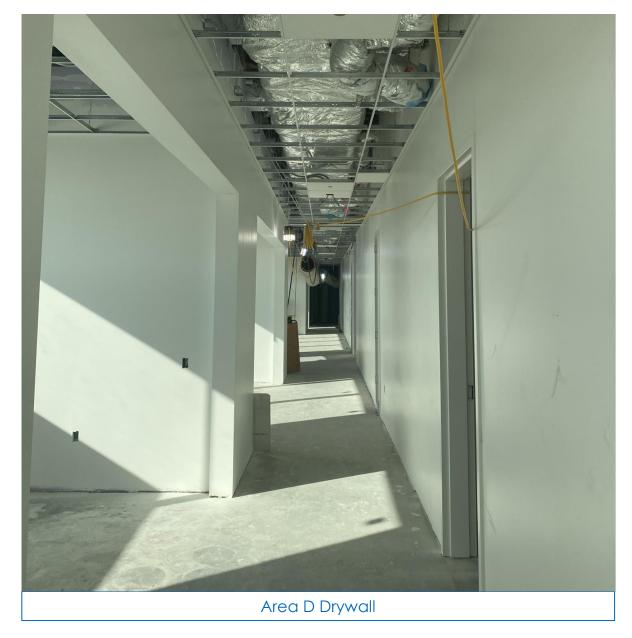

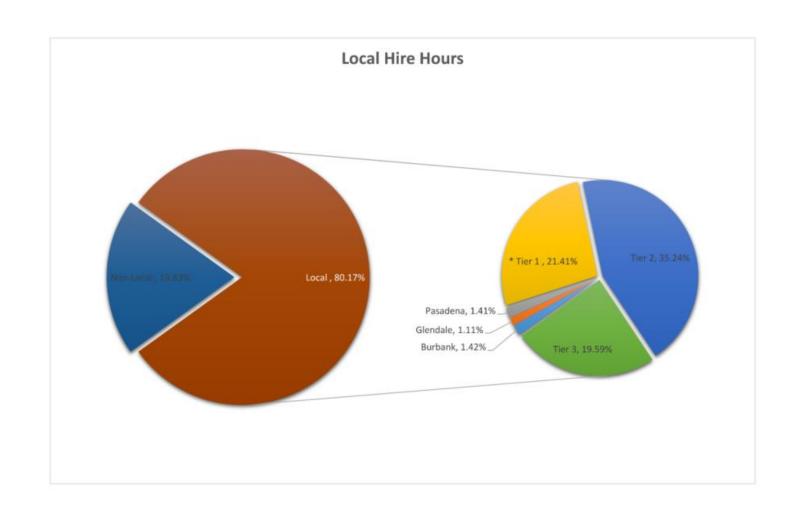

DA Interpretation

- The DA requires a dedicated lane for public transit
- The site design accommodated public transit and valet with separate entries into the garage and a dedicated public transit lane inside the garage to fulfill this requirement
- Upon final review by the City of Burbank, concern was raised that as designed, public transit was not afforded a clear path in case of traffic congestion
- Following this interpretation, the design was augmented after the GMP was established to provide separation between public transit and valet
- · As result of the design revision:
 - City agreed to revised layout
 - Revised design provides clear sight for passengers to terminal parking and valet drop-off



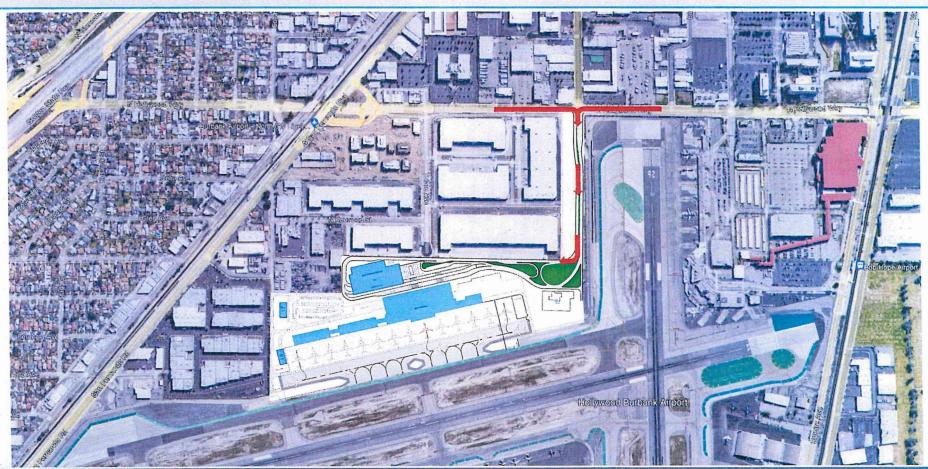

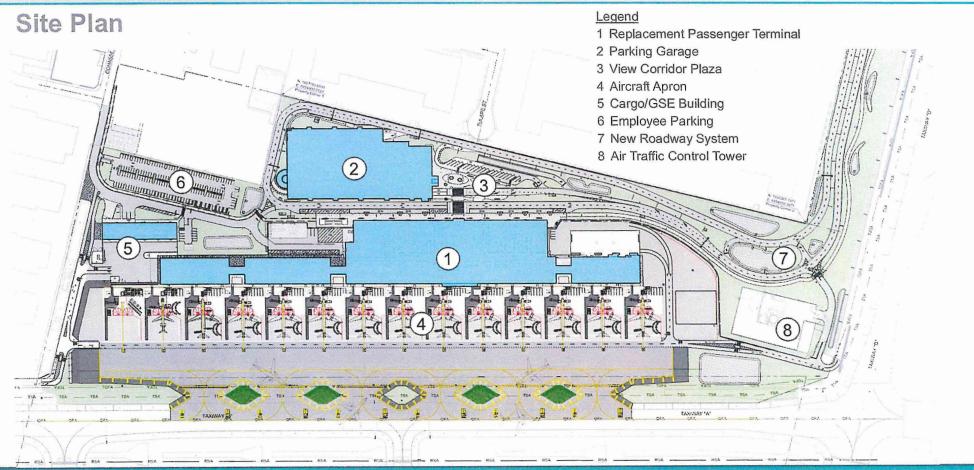
















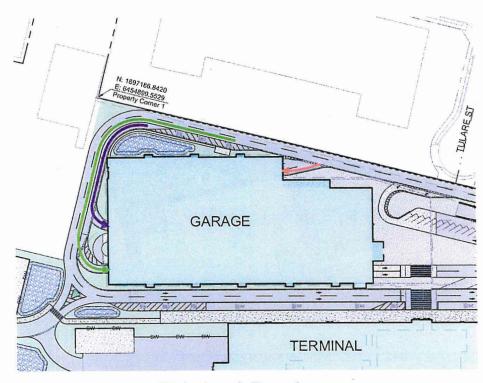




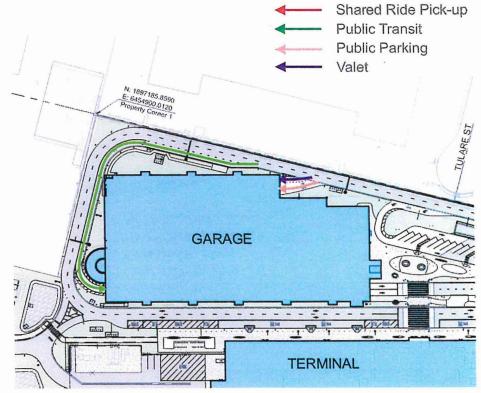
Shared Ride Drop-Off
